Look for Record Crowd If Weather Holds Good

Should the weatherman smile on Georgetown Fall Fair on Friday and Saturday of this week, the Esqueving Agricultural Society look for one of the biggest events in their long history. Entries, too, have been coming in in greater numbers and the 107th annual event should also see one of its largest lists of exhibitors and exhibits.

The fair building opens at 9:00 o'clock Friday morning to receive the entries in the baking, ladies work, flower and vegetable classes. Judging will begin at 1:00 and the hall will be open for public inspection beginning at seven in the evening.

The fair proper on Saturday will get away to an early start with the exhibiting of livestock, the horse show and harness races commence promptly at 12:30. Poultry judging at 10 o'clock.

The midway promises to be better than ever this year, with rides and games for young and old. While there will be a ferris wheel and other rides, the merry go round promised has broken down and will not be available.

The directors of the fair are hopeful that everyone will turn out to their annual show. They have spent many hours of planning this event for your enjoyment and look forward to meeting you and your friends at Georgetown Fair.

For the dancing crowd the usual big fair night dance will take place in the Arena on Friday evening with the Debonnaires supplying the music.

Let's make '53 another record-breaking show, both with your exhibits and your attendance.

THREE COURSES HERE RURAL NIGHT SCHOOL

Halton Rural Night School will branch out this winter, with three courses offered in Georgetown and three in Acton as well as the variety of courses which will again be offered in the county town.

As a result of representations made to the Community Programs Branch, Dept. of Education after a meeting of interested Georgetown and Acton people a few weeks ago, Dick Licata, Georgetown and Mrs. Wes Beatty, Acton, have been added to the planning committee.

It is not yet known what courses may be held in town. The Arts and Crafts organization has undertaken to advertise the night school locally and to coordinate courses here. It is planned to circularize every citizen by mail. Some suggested courses here are leathercraft, oil painting, metalcraft, ceramics, millinery, photography and wood carving. Questionnaires will be answered, and courses which will serve the majority of those interested will be chosen.

As most courses are limited to about a dozen people, early applications will assure Georgetown people of a chance to attend the local courses. All courses in Milton will, of course, be also available as in former years, when several from town have travelled there weekly for instruction.
