Explains Extension Work in Metropolitan Toronto

On Sunday morning, St. John's United Church had as their guest speaker, Rev. J. G. Torrence, of Toronto, whose task at present is the very large one of directing United Church Extension in the vast new Metropolitan Toronto areas. Even living in our rural community, with an ordinary amount of travelling, it does not take much observation to realize how greatly and quickly almost every district is growing, and reliable figures show that this is much greater in and around every city and major town, with substantial industries growing in these places attracting still further the flow of population to these areas. And as the projects develop young families move in, children grow, business firms follow quickly and whereas in the past there was time for the church to wait for a nucleus to start almost of itself and largely foster its own growth, recent developments are too fast for that. These young married people soon realize that they are missing the spiritual things they had grown up with, and especially so as their children grow and show that they are missing them too.

One instance of this, Mr. Torrence related, of a growing boy who had been watching the men working on new houses around him, come to his father and said the men kept talking about Jesus Christ, who was that? Then a few days later remarked that when they got mad, they would shout about God, who was he? That family soon realized that their children were missing out, and were learning sacred spiritual names and things in the wrong places and manner. They are growingly concerned about themselves and their children as they realize their lack of what they are learning are real and essential things in their lives and are quite willing, as they are showing distinctly, to work and give for places of worship.

Only they need someone to give the initiative, show them how to start and give them some help and direction. This is where church extension organization comes in and has a large place in Canada's present growth, securing the necessary suitable land, with provision for future parking as required in these new projects, before it is taken by large companies, banks, etc. and then directing the beginning of worship in a public school, often portable, or a community hall, until some organization, work can start from that and some loan arranged to make a start on a church building of their own. Fortunately Mr. Torrence seems to be almost as busy attending the laying of corner stones and dedication services of new churches, as he is interviewing school boards, and trustees, etc. for the use of rooms to start a new Sunday School or religious service.

Rev. John M. Smith told the boys and girls of the S.B.E. boy who always had an answer ready: "Let Mary do it, she's a girl," or "Let Jim do it, he's bigger than me," until when later, opportunity knocked, he could always think of somebody else to do it. So now that he is grown up and should be occupying a useful position. Somebody else is doing it.

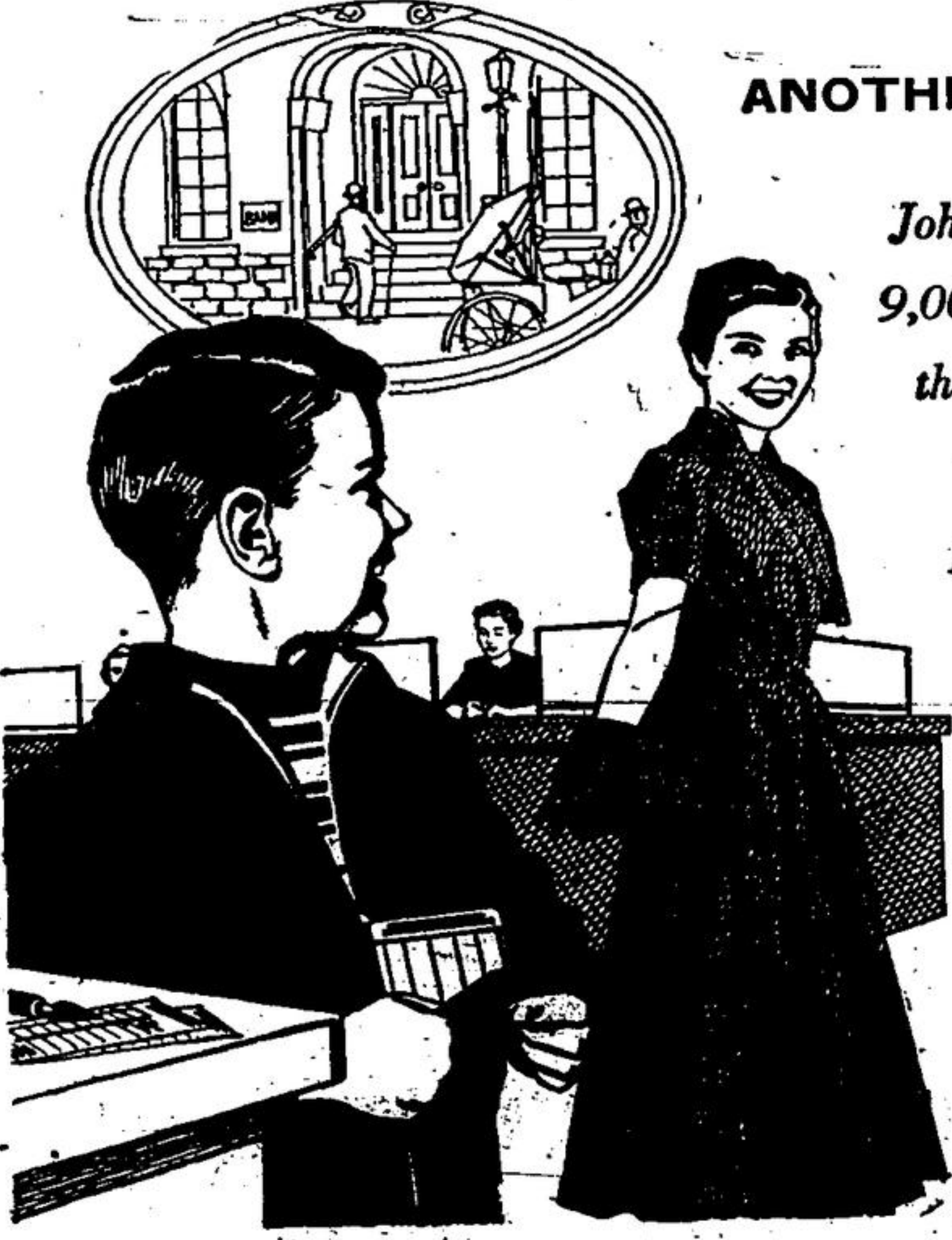
