WHAT COUNCIL DID

Population Increases 200 Assess't Jumps \$443,000

Georgetown has had a population increase of almost 200 in the past year and increased buildings, plus an upward revision in assessment rate on industrial properties has increased the assessment by \$443,000.

Reporting to council this week, assessment commissioner Joseph Gibbons explained that this means that if the town has the same mill rate next year, there will be an extra \$20,000 available in current taxes.

The population figure of 3589 in 1952 has increased to 3779 this year.

Assessment shows an increase from \$3,784,000 to \$4,208,000 according to the tax roll returned by the assessor. Mr. Gibbons said that his figures show that the town still maintains a good balance between residential, industrial and commercial properties, using the yardstick set up by experts.

The large Smith & Stone plant has had a \$50,000 increase in assessment, and other large industries proportionately the same, due to "location obsolescence" being eliminated from assessment reckoning.

With oil heating for the municipal building under discussion for some time, it has been decided to get an independent heating engineer to look over the building and make a recommendation.

If his report is favourable, tenders would then be called for a heating system.

By-laws have been sent for Municipal Board approval for a \$113,000 water extension project which will include a \$50,000 reservoir, and a \$9,200 sewer extension into the Sunbeam Heights subdivision on the former Tyers property.

Council gave the necessary two readings to the by-laws, the third reading not being possible until approval has been received from the board.

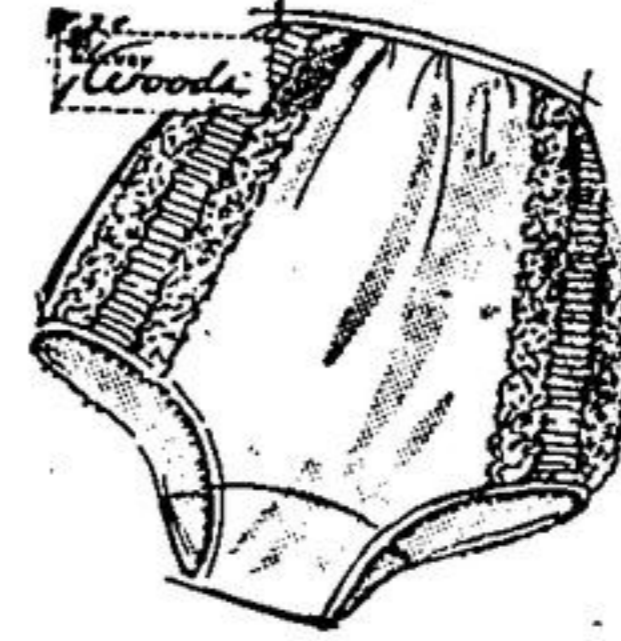
An agreement has been signed between council and John Oliver regarding occupancy of the apartment above the fire hall which Mr. Oliver has as part of his agreement for fire hall duty.

Free light, heat, water and rent are provided, with Mr. Oliver being responsible for 24 hour service in answering fire and police calls, as well as cutting grass and snow shovelling around the building. The agreement can be terminated by either party with one week's notice.

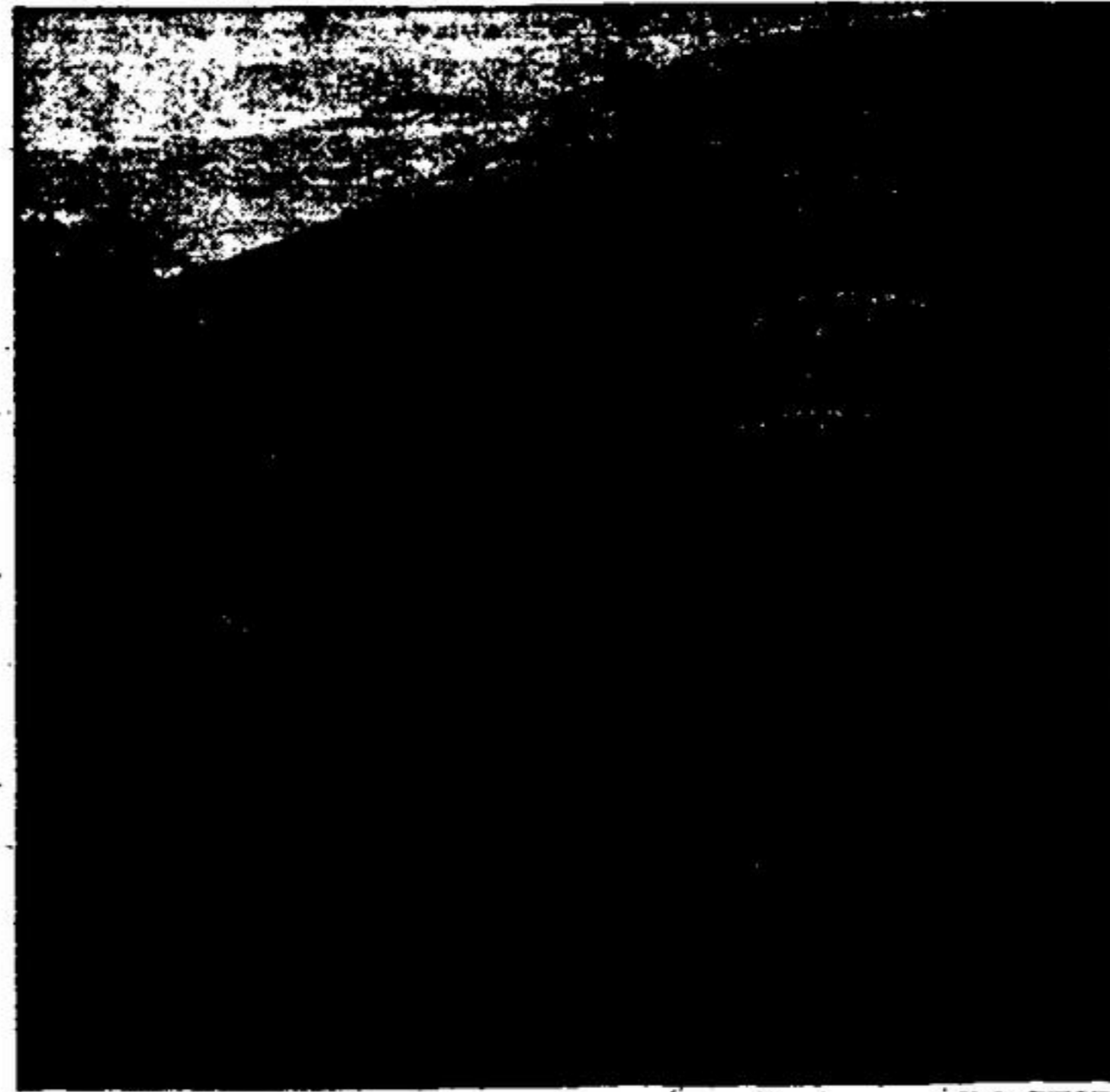
