

Traffic Problems Investigated

Still another problem which besets a growing town is traffic control, and council is wisely investigating possible measures of control at several dangerous spots.

The two most troublesome places downtown are at the four corners and at the John Street intersection with No. 7 Highway. Here consideration is being given to installing traffic lights, and if this should be done it will give Georgetown its first such signals. At present a warning blinker at John Street is the only such contraption in town limits.

Important, too with the heavy highway traffic which streams along No. 7 are two dangerous crossings to public schools. Until last year, there was only one school to worry about, to which half the town children had to cross a busy highway on their way to school. Construction of the new Wigglesworth School intensified this problem when many from the east part of town were transferred to

the new school. No one will argue that the old crossing is dangerous, though somewhat aided by traffic in one direction going uphill, and from the other, rounding a curve which tends to slow cars down. The new crossing has neither of these compensating factors, and is therefore a major menace. Two near tragedies have already occurred this year, in spite of vigilant supervision at the crossing, and an improved system cannot come too soon.

A delegation of parents at the last school board meeting were assured by the board of cooperation in taking the matter to council, which already had discussed it on their own. Here it is possible manual traffic lights may be the answer. The delegation also asked for a guard rail along the narrow stretch of buried sidewalk from Durham Street to the school crossing, and this too would be a blessing, not only to schoolchildren but, in fact, to any pedestrian who uses this dangerous right of way.


TAKES CARPENTER COURSE AT RYERSON

Carl is taking his apprentice training as a carpenter, and will return to practical work after his two months of schooling, returning to Ryerson next year for a further two months of training.

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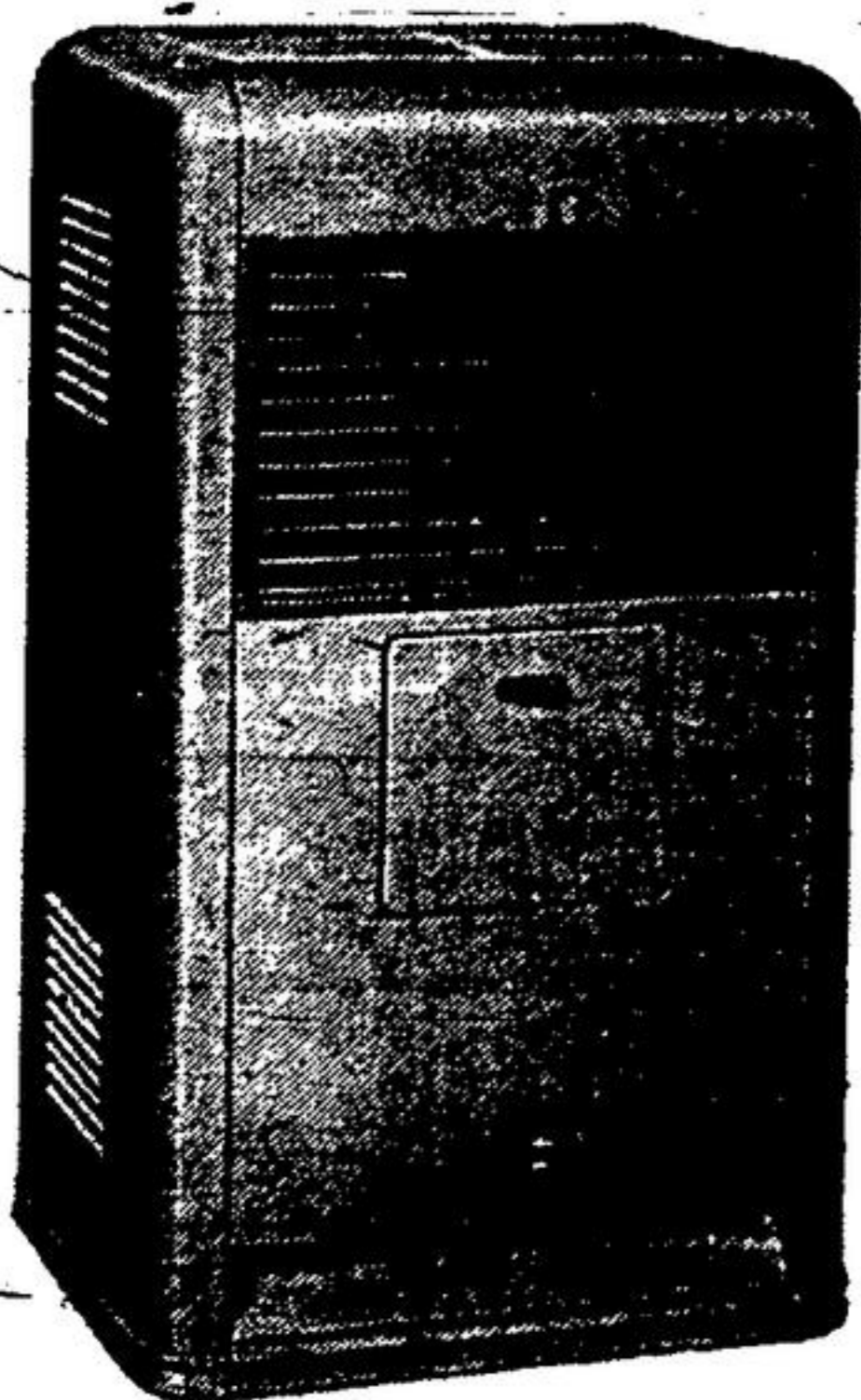
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
