High School Teachers Seek Salary Increase

Decision on a request for salary adjustments and a revision of the salary schedule for high school teachers in Georgetown, Acton and was deferred for a full board meeting when the matter was discussed at a meeting of North Halton high school board on Monday in Acton.

The repuest by teachers was received by the board last summer and was turned over to the management committee of the school board. This committee at Monday's meeting reported that they had been unable to come to a decision and turned the matter back to the board as a whole.

The teachers' request was made after the hiring of a teacher at Acton this year at a salary which is \$300 above what he would receive under the existing schedule. Members of the board while not unsympathetic to some salary revision, claim that the schedule was not violated, as a clause allows the board to pay a higher salary in "exceptional circumstances" which in this case was a lack of applicants who would accept the position at less money.

The present salary schedule establishes a maximum of \$5,000, an extra \$100 for use of a specialist certificate, and a yearly increment of \$206. The original minimum salary was dropped from the schedule in a motion passed at a meeting in June. When hiring a new teacher, the board is allowed to pay \$100 a year up to 5 years' experience, which based on the Teacher's Federation suggested minimum of \$3000 limits the hiring of experienced teachers. It is the teachers suggestion that this clause be revised, to allow the poard to hire experienced teachers and pay them a rate similar to that which presently employed teachers receive based on their years of service.

Night School Again

This year, the school board will once again sponsor weekly night classes for new Canadians if there is sufficient demand in the three towns. Miss Florence Luke, with the assistance of Principal J. L. Lambert will continue to teach the Georgetown class and registration date here has been called for next Tuesday.

Hall of Fame

Adopting an idea which has been in force at Malvern Collegiate in the city, the board allocated funds to the three schools to provide framed pictures of graduates who had won scholarships which will be hung in a suitable place in each school.

No Salesmen

A request from Acton Students Council that they be allowed to sell magazines as a fund--raising activity, led to the board deciding that salesmen and agents be forbidden to discuss their products with students during school hours or on school property.

While sympathetic to any endeavor to raise money, the board felt that this can be overdone, and that it is not proper for a school to have students acting as commercial agents or to associate themselves with private business.

ACCIDENT VICTIM DIES FROM INJURIES

Injured when he was struck by a car in Norval two weeks ago. Herbert Caseley, 69, died in Toronto General Hospital on Sunday.

At first thought to have suffered only a broken leg Mr. Caseley was later found to have internal mjuries. He was taken from Bram, ton Hospital last week for treatment in Toronto and diei a few days after undergoing an operation.

Mr. Caseley was employed at the old Provincial Paper "lower mill" for many years until the mill was closed down recently. He was a member of the Quarter Century

Club of the company. Born in England in 1884, he was the son of Robert Caseley and Mary Jane Whittan, and came to Canada

as a youth of seventeen. In 1906, he married Violet Hillis in Toronto. He was a member of the Anglican Church and of the Canadian Order of Chosen Friends. Surviving are his wife, four children Gordon, John and Millie, Mrs. John Marshall of Norval, and Addie, Mrs. William Shields, Victoria and seven grandchildren. He was predeceased by a daughter, Edith Mrs. John Marshall in 1932 and a brother, Gordon of Toronto.
