These latter two points are something that have been lacking in past years.

The president of the Legion, the group sponsoring the 'kid' hockey, Les Clark, along with most of the men present, felt that the parents of the boys were not showing enough interest, and their attendance at the odd Saturday morning game would boost the lads' morale 100 per cent. There is nothing like a parent on hand to help the kids really go to town. Suggestions were asked to help create some interest before the season starts.

It was suggested that a parents' night be held before the season, and all parents (and interested adults invited to attend. Lunch will be provided, the lads can register that night for the season, a film will be shown, and it is hoped to have a prominent hockey star, past or present, on hand. All interested adults, whether parents or not are urged to attend.

Sweaters with the NHL colours are being purchased for the league and are hoped to be on display that evening. The Legion will sponsor this type of hockey, not only in OMHA, but in little NHL too, this year, as well as having a midget and bantam team.
