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LEGION NOTES

It was also decided to present the Georgetown Fire Brigade with a flag, for their new building in appreciation of the kindly cooperative spirit that has always marked relations between the two organizations. The subject was brought up when the president mentioned that the Fire Brigade had ordered a flag through him and he felt that the least the Legion could do for such a public spirited group was to ask them to accept it as a small token of the esteem in which they were held. 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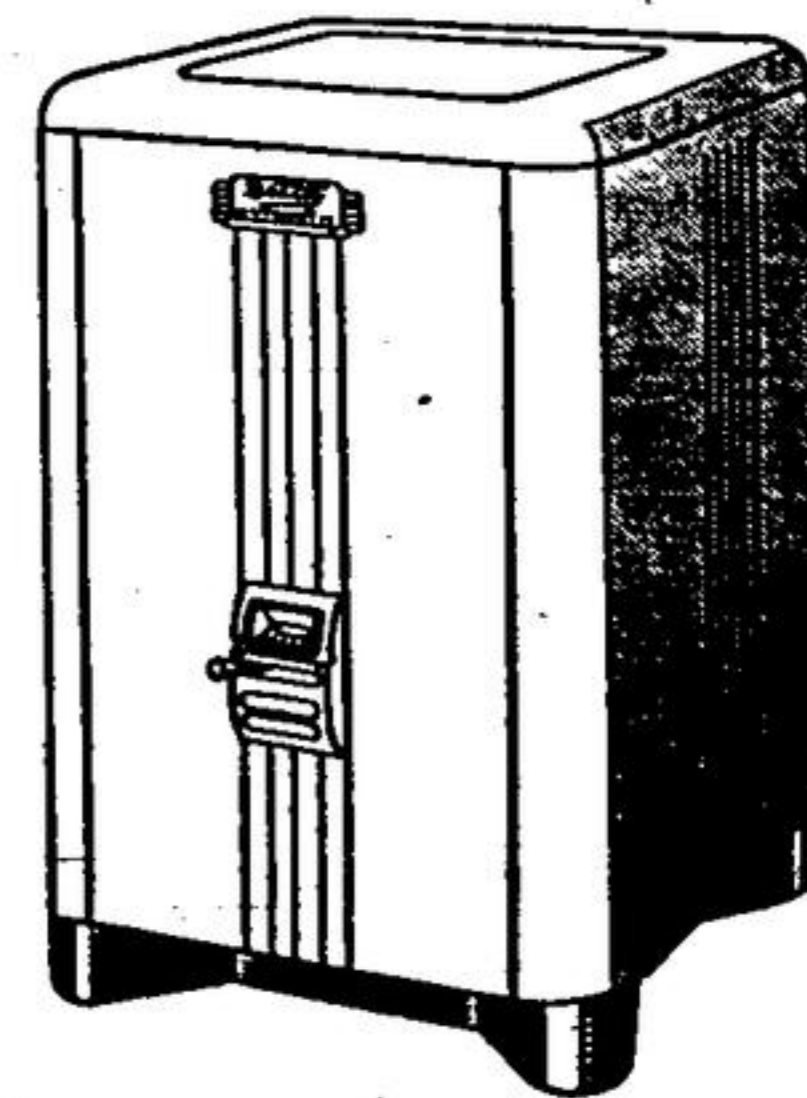
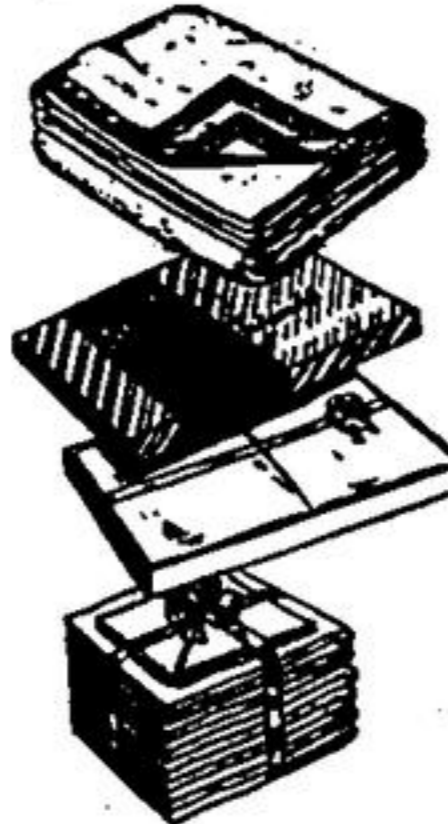
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
