In their Canadian News pages last week. Time the U.S. weekly magazine spent some time discussing the recent sale by the government of the Orenda engine plant to A. V. Roc. Here's what Time had Plants for Sale":

worked together to increase Canaada's defense production after the outbreak of the Korean war. The build the plant, then gave A. V. Roe (Canada) 1.td. a contract to run it. In less than two years, Orenda jet engines were coming off the Malton assembly line. Similar combinations of government capital and private industry know-how were used successfully in more than 100 plants, speeding arms production far faster than it might have gone if either government or industry had tried to do it alone.

Last week the Malton engine plant was involved in another deal that may set a pattern for the future of Canada's defence industry. Avro announced the purchase of the government owned property for \$17.5 million, returning the government more than 97c on every dollar of its original investment. Avro will continue to turn out Orenda engines on military order, and eventually plans to convert the 750,000 sq.-ft. factory, hangars and storage space to peacetime use (e.g., commercial aircraft, appliances, air conditioners.)

With more than \$175 million invested in defence plants across the country, the government is hopeful tion.

In each case, Ottawa is holding out for a top price and for adequate guarantees that the plants will be available for defense production as long as they may be needed. As Beaupre explained it, the government has no intention of running a fire sale for buyers who want to turn the plants solely into civilian produc-

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
