Movies and story of the second half of a round the world jeep trip drew a large andience in St. John's Hall to hear the famous Wilkins Brothers on their second appearance in Georgetown last week.

Toronto residents Warren Douglas Wilkins, who hast spring showed their movies taken in Europe, Afghanistan, and India, athis time took a picture tour of Burma, Indo-China, Siam, Hong Kong and Japan. A running commentary, each brother taking half the show, complemented the excellent movies which the brothers took and edited themselves.

Pictures were taken on a 25,000 mile overland journey which started in August, 1951. They worked their passage to Europe on a Norwegian freignter, ending in Japan, and a trip home across the Pacific. 


