NORVAL

Active Churchworker When Resident Here

An active church worker during her residence in Norval and since moving to Toronto 33 years ago, Bertha Robinson Pettigrew died on October 31st at her home, 21 Benlamond Avenue.

She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Henry Pettigrew. Her father sold his farm to C. W. Coupland when he retired and moved to the city. Miss Pettigrew was prominent in St. Paul's Anglican Church at Norval and in Toronto was associated with St. John's Norway Church. She was a life member of the W.A. and was active in Red Cross work during the second World War.

She leaves one sister, Margaret Pettigrew and a niece Mrs. J. E. Clark, Toronto. Two sisters predeceased her, Annie, Mrs. Rheinhold Guenther and Edith, Mrs. Fred Apted.

The funeral service last Tuesday in St. John's Church was followed by interment in St. John's Norway Cemetery.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Action Promised on School Crossing Light

While making no decision on a request for a traffic light at the Wrigglesworth School crossing, council promised a full discussion and some action at their next meeting when the subject was discussed on Monday.

School board chairman Edwin Wilson and several interested ratepayers whose children have to cross the highway at this point, were at the meeting and Mr. Wilson asked council for consideration in going farther in traffic control than it is possible for the board to do.

Council had already obtained prices for various types of lights. One suggestion was to have the light at the Durham Street crossing, though this would make it impossible for anything but a manually controlled signal. It is not believed a guard rail, also requested by the deputation, could be placed along the highway because of interference with snow plowing. A shift to Durham St. would eliminate the need for such a guard rail however.

Mr. Wilson said the board had taken recent action to make the school approach as safe as possible. Children living within reasonable limits have been forbidden to bring bicycles to school, as it is unsafe for them to be on the highway and endangers other children if the bicycles are ridden on the narrow sidewalk.

The town will provide two strings of coloured lights at the four corners on Main Street for use at Christmas time and other special occasions. Estimated cost is \$150.

Charles Wray spoke for a group of merchants requesting this, and council agreed to supply these, with any other Main Street decorations left to the merchants themselves.

Officers for the folk school are: Clifford Brown, Esquimaux; Mrs. R. Coulter, Nelson; Mrs. G. Robertson, Nassagaweya; Ellen Chapman, Trafalgar; Archie Service, R. S. Heatherington, R. McLaughlin, S. Turner and Mrs. R. E. Ellenton.

Blue Springs forum has been reorganized for this season in Nassagaweya. The first review night will see a rally in Nelson Hall, when it is hoped to have the provincial secretary, Clifford Walte present to give advice to members.

AID SOCIETY SEEKS HOME FOR CHILDREN

The superintendent of Halton Children's Aid Society and the reception home committee are taking necessary steps to procure another home in the county for the temporary care of children, following a decision by Mrs. David Clarke, Milton, to drop this work the end of the year.

The matter was dealt with when the October meeting was held in the society's office in Milton recently.

There was a discussion on adoptions, older children in particular, and the recent provincial report on child care and adoption services was considered at the meeting.

A total of 62 cases were in the hands of the society at the month-end, eleven of these new cases and two reopened, and 71 visits were made by Superintendent Frank Thompson in October. There were 117 children being cared for, 33 society wards in paid boarding homes. One hundred visits were paid to children in care and there were two new unmarried parent cases.
