The superintendent of Halton Children's Aid Society and the reception home committee are taking necessary steps to procure another home in the county for the temporary care of children, following a decision by Mrs. David Clarke, Milton, to drop this work the end

The matter was dealt with when the October meeting was held in the society's office in Milton recently.

There was a discussion on adoptions, older children in particular, and the recent provincial report on child care and adoption services was considered at the meeting.

A total of 62 cases were in the hands of the society at the month-- end, eleven of these new cases and two reopened, and 71 visits were made by Superintendent Frank Thompson in October. There were 117 children being cared for, 33 society wards in paid boarding homes. One hundred visits were paid to children in care and there were two new unmarried parent


