to provide a through road from the highway to the College View district is expected to start within the next two weeks.

At Monday's council meeting, the tender of Louis J. Looby. Debtin, lowest of four received for the job of installing a culvert over the creek was accepted. Contract price is \$4,310, exclusive of concrete and steel. County engineer Roy Smith, who was present at the meeting had estimated the job at \$5500, including materials and the total will be somewhat above that figure. Other tenders from Ontario Bridge Co., Toronto, Hurley Construction, Toronto and John Susan Co., Niagara Falls, were for \$4350, \$4500 and \$6350 respectively.

Total cost of the project including future paving is estimated at \$27,000 and council passed third reading of a borrowing by-lew for this amount at the meeting.

Permission was granted to Bob and Keith Barber, appearing for the Barber Floral Co. to build two houses on the King and Sarah St. corner on lots which slightly vary from the building by-law restric-

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Mr. Ketth Barber explained that the land had been subdivided before the by-law came into effect and many houses are already built on small lots. The remaining lot has frontage of 86 ft. on one street and 132 feet on the other, and because of industrial conditions the lot is not saleable for a large house. Splitting the lot into two, the frontage and total area would be more than the minimum in the by-law, but depth of each lot

would lack 14 feet. Council was sympathetic and allowed Barber Floral to proceed with building two houses.

An account of \$1495 as the town's 50 per cent share of hospital accounts during the past year drew comment from council.

"It shows the need for health insurance" commented Cr. Allen. "I think we've already got it, said Cr. Goodlet as he exclaimed on the high cost of hospitalization for indigent patients.

A letter from county council explained that in future accounts would be rendered quarterly to allow better budgeting for municipalities. '

Decision on a request from Mc-Nally Construction to extend sewers to four houses being built at the end of Parkview Blvd. was left for recommendation by the public works commiftee.

Councillors looked pleased when a letter from William Kinrade commended the town men on the neat, efficient job they had done in putting a storm sewer line through his property.

"We should frame this," said Deputy Reeve Petch. "It isn't often we get any congratulatory letters."

Property owners on Temple Road, James Mulholland, Ed Francis, Roderick King and Harvey Chappel asked council if the town could help straighten out a property situation where homes had been built 8 ft. farther towards the road allowance than they should have

Council replied that at the present time they could take no action on the matter.

Third reading of a by-law authorized proceeding with 6 inch water mains in the Tyers subdivision and on Young and Charles Street.

A 4 inch water meter, which will cost \$500 will be installed at the Alliance paper mill. replacing the present 2 inch meter.

With the possibility of installing oil heating in the Municipal Building, tenders will be asked for doing this work.
