#### Christianity Answer To Communism: Ward .

A teacher in West China University for 21 years. Miss Ann I. Ward was speaker at an all-day meeting in St. John's United Church last Tuesday. It was a sectional meeting of the WMS and the W.A. of

the church. Miss Ward based her talk on a verse from the 17th Chapter of John: That they all may be one, I in them, and thou in me. She spoke as a Christian woman to Christian women, and as one committed to the task of the church, a worldwide Christian fellowship, the worldwide Council of Churches.

There is an expression of things being "out of this world." Miss Ward thinks many are living "out of this world" in a small, encased way of life, not seeing things as they are, and not having courage

to face conditions truthfully. She told the story of a family in China she has known for a long time. The mother has had no advantages, she still has bound feet. She has six daughters, all of whom were sent to university. The first became a Christian teacher and a nutritionist, another a public health nurse, one a teacher, two doctors, and the youngest a nutritionist.

Miss Ward recommended a book which was on the literature table. for sale "Resolution" by Allen Birtwhistle, a study of the Missionary situation up to date. There is a great change taking place all over the world. People in non-Christian countries are awakening to the fact that conditions for them should be different. Christian missions are telling them this\_

Africa is a sample of change. In former days, the people accepted disease, illiteracy, poverty. Now they know these things should be different and they expect them to be. That is revolution. To all of this unrest, Communism is the wrong answer. We Christians have the right answer -- do we hold it back from them?

"Do we know what we believe?" was the challenging question put by Miss Ward. The Communists know what they believe and they put hours of study on their belief. How strong is our committment? A Chinese Christian pastor told his congregation, when the government rebelled against Christlanity, that their church building might be taken from them, but the people remain a church. This very fact took

When Miss Ward came back from China, she noticed a roll of honor in every church for those who had given their lives in the wars. She thinks there should be a roll of henour as well for those who have become ministers or missionaries in foreign countries. She spoke of the power of witnessing for Christ and how that power, once released. can never be destroyed, and closed with a question: How strong to your committeent to Christianity?
