Miss Nevitt told how a public health nurse keeps in touch with parents through the children. She said that science has given us an opportunity to live longer and that the health unit's aim is to help people, physically and mentally, to live a useful life right to the end.

### Many "Royal" Wins For Sunset Farm

Cory Herrington, local fancy poultry breeder, had some outstanding wins at the Royal Winter Fair this year, taking major prizes in the many breeds which he entered.

For the eighth successive year, he won best display honours in three classes, Buff Rocks, Buff Leghorns and Buff Cochin Bantams, and for the twelfth time in his 24 years of showing there he had best display of Buff Orpingtons. He also won best display in Silkie Bantams.

Mr. Herrington, who operates his business at Stewarttown under the name Sunset Farm, had several individual wins in Rhode Island Red bantams, Old English Black Red Games, Single Comb Black Minorcas and Buff Laced Bearded Polands.

Owner of the only stock in Canada of Golden Unbearded Polish poultry, he showed a trio of these which had wide interest for feather fanciers.

Mr. Herrington is also acting as a judge at the fair, judging such classes as Brahmas, Cochins, Australorps, Andalusians, French breeds, English AOV and AOV fowl.

Another Georgetown exhibitor, Clarence Spence had best display of Houdans, while Harvey Lusty won some prizes for his pigeons. Percy Clark & Son of Georgetown also had a few entries at the fair.

### BANK CHRISTMAS PLAN ENCOURAGES SAVINGS

The first nation-wide Christmas Club plan in Canada, intended to help banish Yuletide financial problems, has been announced by The Canadian Bank of Commerce.

Bank officials said that the plan, which goes into effect November 16th in preparation for Christmas, 1954, had been designed to suit any budget. "After choosing a suitable plan," a spokesman said, "you simply make a small deposit once every two weeks throughout the year. At the end of 50 weeks — or 25 deposits — a cheque is mailed to you in time for Christmas."

In the United States last year, Christmas Clubs organized in banks and other savings institutions paid out \$1,023,000,000 to approximately 11,712,000 "members."

Christmas Club members, Bank of Commerce officials said, receive special coupon books which serve as a passbook and receipt and payment-reminder record.

The Christmas Club is divided into five plans. Twenty five semi-monthly deposits of \$1 ensure a cheque for \$25 in November, 1954. Two dollar deposits provide a cheque for \$50, \$5 a cheque for \$125, \$10 a cheque for \$250 and \$20 a cheque for \$500.
