PLAN FOLK SCHOOL AT ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the Halton Folk School committee was held recently in the court house at Milton. Mrs. A. R. Coulter was appointed as chairman and Mrs. R. E. Ellenton as secretary treasurer. An invitation to hold the 1954 Halton Folk School at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Mac Alexander was accepted. Plans for a programme planning meeting and the selection of a "theme" are under way.

Due to the fact that the planning committee of the Halton Night School has included "Leadership Training" as one of the classes in Milton under the heading of "Effective Business Procedures" a resolution was passed by the Folk School Committee recommending to the Halton Federation of Agriculture that the leadership course be laid over for another year.

Meningitis, Polio Threaten Young People

Two local young people, threatened with serious illness, are making good recoveries.

Paul Stamp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Stamp, who contracted spinal meningitis last week, was successfully treated at Guelph General Hospital and has suffered no ill effects. It is expected that he will be home from hospital later this week.

Mr. and Mrs. Marshall Timbers got a shock when it was believed their daughter, Donna, had polio. Symptoms similar to this disease proved to be false. She is at present in St. Joseph's Hospital, in Guelph, and is much improved in health.

Following an enjoyable sing-song led by Murray McPhail, with Mrs. George Robertson as accompanist the main feature of the programme presided over by president Wilfred Kennedy was an address by John Brodrick of St. Catharines, past president of the Ontario Federation of Agriculture. Mr. Brodrick took as his subject "A Policy for Canadian Agriculture."

In a very comprehensive manner the speaker reviewed the problems facing agriculture in Canada and discussed the possibilities of production controls — the two price policy, etc. A panel discussion chaired by agricultural representative J. E. Whitelock followed — the panel consisting of Professor Ralph Campbell, of the Department of Economics, Guelph, J. C. Broderick; W. E. Breckon, Burlington;
