**IDA FARMER FIRST IN WHEAT CLUB**

Robert Armstrong, Ida, took first place in the provincial competition of the 50-Bushel Wheat Club, sponsored by the Maple Leaf Milling Co. and the Soil and Crop Improvement Association, the Crops, Seeds and Weeds Branch of the Ontario Dept. of Agriculture announced today. The award, a cash prize of \$75 and a silver tray, was won on a sample of Dawbul wheat which also placed first in the Peterboro County competition with a tested yield of 68.8 bushels per acre. The three high scoring entrants of each county are eligible for this provincial contest. As a result Mr. Armstrong's win was over the best field crops in the 15 most important winter wheat growing counties of the province. The provincial entries are judged on the exhibition and milling quality. The ten prize winning exhibits were on display at the Royal Winter Fair. Yields in the ten prize winning entries ranged from 69.6 to a low of 54.4. Increased yield, the result of the use of good seed and sound cultural practices, has influenced the committee in charge to revise the name of the competition to the "60 Bushel Wheat Club" for 1954. Standings, variety and yield of the ten winning entries follow. Robert Armstrong, Ida, Dawbul, 68.8 yield; Charles Casey, King, Dawbul, 69.6; William Latimer, Sutton West, Cornell, 67.2; W. W. Dawson, Peterboro, Dawbul, 58.8; E. Ruthven, Port Hope, Cornell, 58.4; Rosafe Farms, Brampton, Dawbul, 57.8; R. K. Squalr, Bowmanville, Cornell, 64.0; George Jakeman, Beachville, Dawbul, 55.2; Mrs. L. Weddell, Sharon, Cornell, 68.0; John Kleffer, Mildmay, Cornell, 54.4. Judging was based on appearance, weight per bushel, weight per 1000 kernels, freedom from disease and protein.
