BIRD IS REEVE,

Sinclair, Wilson Councillors As Reeve Leslie, Schenk Retire

Esquesing Township will have two new faces on council next year; and one new member of county council. All offices were filled by acclamation at Monday's nomination meeting in Stewarttown. Reeve George Leslie, who is county warden, is retiring, as well as William Schenk, Glen Williams, who has been a council member for two

Deputy Reeve Wilfrid Bird will step up to the reeveship and Councillor Walter Linham becomes deputy reeve. Councillor George Currie remains on the council, and Spencer Wilson and Campbell Sinclair are the new councillors.

William Dobbie, John H. Bingham and Robert J. Cunningham were returned as members of the school area board for two year terms and James Kirkwood, Ballinafad, was nominated to serve a one year term vacated by Hector Bird.

Leslie Retiring

Retiring after seven years on council, and holder of the highest honour in county politics this year, Reeve George Leslie spoke of the problems of assessment and equalization which a fast growing county

dollar increase in assessment in vice. one year. In 1953, an equalization was arrived at, after several meetings between municipal assessors and the county committee,, avoiding appeals which have hampered county administration in the past.

Mr. Leslie spoke of certain aspects of county work, including roads, the court house and Centennial Manor. A \$30,000 government cut in the road budget had reduced estimates for gravelling, grading, and work on county links. Extensive renovation work is being done on the county buildings, which will include a new vault, a law library

and redecorating. He spoke of growth in the township, reflected in \$200,000 in building permits issued, and said future councils would face heavy expenditures for roads, schools and services which suburban development entails.

Bird New Reeve

The new reeve, Wilfrid Bird, dealt with other aspects of county work, including the important reforestation program. This year purchase of 65 more acres makes a total of 1200 acres now owned by the county for this purpose.

A \$250,000 debenture issue for the Centennial Manor, bearing intest at 41/2% was sold at slightly over par. The Health Unit, an important county service, is carried on at a cost of \$1.20 per capita, half of which is paid by the province.

Suggests Trailer By-Law

A by-law to regulate trailers was suggested by Walter Linham who will enter county council this year as deputy reeve. He spoke of the building by-law, and said it was not designed to force anyone to build an expensive home, but rather to ensure that any building constructed would be an asset to the community.

Roads are wider nowaders, and increased maintenance should make the township give serious consideration to purchase of a second grader in 1954, in Mr. Linham's opinion. He reviewed bridge and road

repair work. "Where to draw the line and give ratepayers what they want at what they can afford to pay is the problem which faces today's councils" said Mr. Linham. "We must remember that we do not own the township, but are just custodians. We want to leave it better than it was when we took office, but not ·loaded with debt."

Pay-As-We-Go: Currie

Councillor George Currie reiterated his faith in a pay as you go policy, saying that it is not sound business to go running to the Municipal Board for debentures.

"We mustn't let expansion go to our heads," he warned, saying the township had so far paid for most things as they were needed. "A municipality, like an individual, will never get into trouble that

Schenk Retires

Saying he had enjoyed his two years as a councillor, William Schenk said he was not a candidate this year because he did not feel he could spare the time from his business which the work entails.

A nominee, William Dobbie said he was considering frunning for council because his section of the township was not represented, but later changed his mind and remained a school board member. Candidates Spence Wilson and Campbell Sinclair spoke briefly, as did former council member Edwin Harrop, who declined to run.

R. L. Davidson reported for the school board as chairman, telling of expansion which has led to a new school at Norval and an extra classroom at Glen Williams. Messrs. Bingham, Cunnifigham, Kirkwood and Elnott also spoke briefly.

The financial report for the year was presented by the treasurer K. C. Lindsay, who acted as chairman in the absence through illness of clerk I. M. Bennett.
