Rev Vincent Morgan Ordained in India

A nephew of Rev. Vincent J. Morgan, rector of Roman Catholic churches in Georgetown and Acton was ordained to the priesthood in India on November 21st.

He is Rev. Vincent Morgan S.J. who received the Sacred Order of Priesthood at the hands of Most Rev. Ferdinand Perier, S.J., Archbishop of Calcutta.

Father Morgan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis Morgan, St. Ann's Parish, Hamilton. He has another brother in the priesthood, Rev. Francis Morgan, assistant priest, St. Joseph's Church, Kitchener. A sister is Sister Marie Brebut of the Sisters of St. Joseph, Brantford.

Born at Hamilton in 1918, Father Morgan was educated at St. Ann's School and Cathedral High School. In 1940 he entered St. Stanislaus' Novitiate, Guelph. Philosophical studies were made at the Jesuit Seminary in Toronto. In 1947 he was assigned to Darjeeling Mission in India in a group of the first scholastics to be sent to this mission post of the Canadian Province of the Society of Jesus.

He took up teaching duties in St. Joseph's College there. The next year he spent in the study of Nepal at the Kurseong Theological, followed by another year of teaching at St. Robert's High School, at Darjeeling. In 1951 he returned to Kurseong to begin his theological studies.

Father Morgan celebrated his first solemn Mass on November 22 at St. John's Nepali Church, Kurseong. He will offer Mass for his benefactors on December 31st.

To commemorate his ordination in his home parish, a solemn high Mass was celebrated by his brother in St. Ann's Church, November 22nd. His uncle Rev. Vincent Morgan was deacon and Rev. V. Cullaton was subdeacon.
