Tree Planting Machine Would Aid Conservation

In order to encourage tree planting on privately owned lands within the county, Halton Conservation Committee at a well attended meeting last Wednesday recommended to the Committee on Agriculture and Reforestation of the County Council, that they purchase a tree planting machine. While the county has acquired 1208 acres for reforestation purposes, it was the general feeling of the Conservation Committee members that on nearly every farm in the county there is an acre or more land not suitable for tillage purposes which should go back into trees. In these days of labour shortage on practically all farms, the hard pressed farm operators hesitate to take on an extra job of hand planting even 1200 trees which is the number required for one acre. The machine recommended for purchase is one equipped with road bearings which permit its transportation behind a car, truck or tractor. Such a machine with a three man crew can readily plant from 6 to 10 acres per

It was the further recommendation of the committee that the county would furnish one man to go with the machine and be responsible for its operation, and that the charge for its use be a very nominal one. Similar action has already been taken in the counties of Wellington, Waterloo, Dufferin, Huron, Brant, and Wentworth County has approved of such a pur-

Farm Ponds

Secretary J. E. Whitelock reported the construction of 24 br 25 ponds under the Halton policy during the current year. It was the opinion of the committee that in future years, in order to facilitate the inspection service from the Agricultural Engineering Department at Guelph, all applications for the current year should be made to the Agricultural Office in Milton by July 1st.

Zone Forester Reports

C. R. Groves, District Zone Forester for the Department of Lands and Forests, reported that in 1953 in answer to requests he had made twenty calls in Halton. On these visits advice was given as to tree species, the number required and arrangement. On woodlot calls, the landowner is advised as to proper care and management of the woodlot and a demonstration of woodlot improvement is given. Our readers who are interested in this service should make their requests either to the Zone Forester at Hespeler, R. R. 1, or to the local office of the Ont. Dept. of Agriculture.

24,000 Trees Planted

It was further reported that on the 1208 acres of County Forest in Halton, 24,000 trees had been planted in 1953. During the summer and fall, work was done on road fireguards and an inventory of the tree cover of the Britton Tract was

In the field of forestry education, eight rural schools entered and completed the work of the 1952 -1953 Halton County School Forestry Competition. Schools entered in this competition were required to plant at least three hundred trees, make a collection of leaves from Ontario forest trees, and have an elementary knowledge of the Reforestation work. The zone forester visited each school in the competition, giving instructions on reforestation and care of the woodlot. Nine school woodlot meetings were held in the county this past fall. About 450 pupils and 30 teachers attended this series of meet-

A similar competition has been organized again this year, in which twenty Halton schools have enter-
