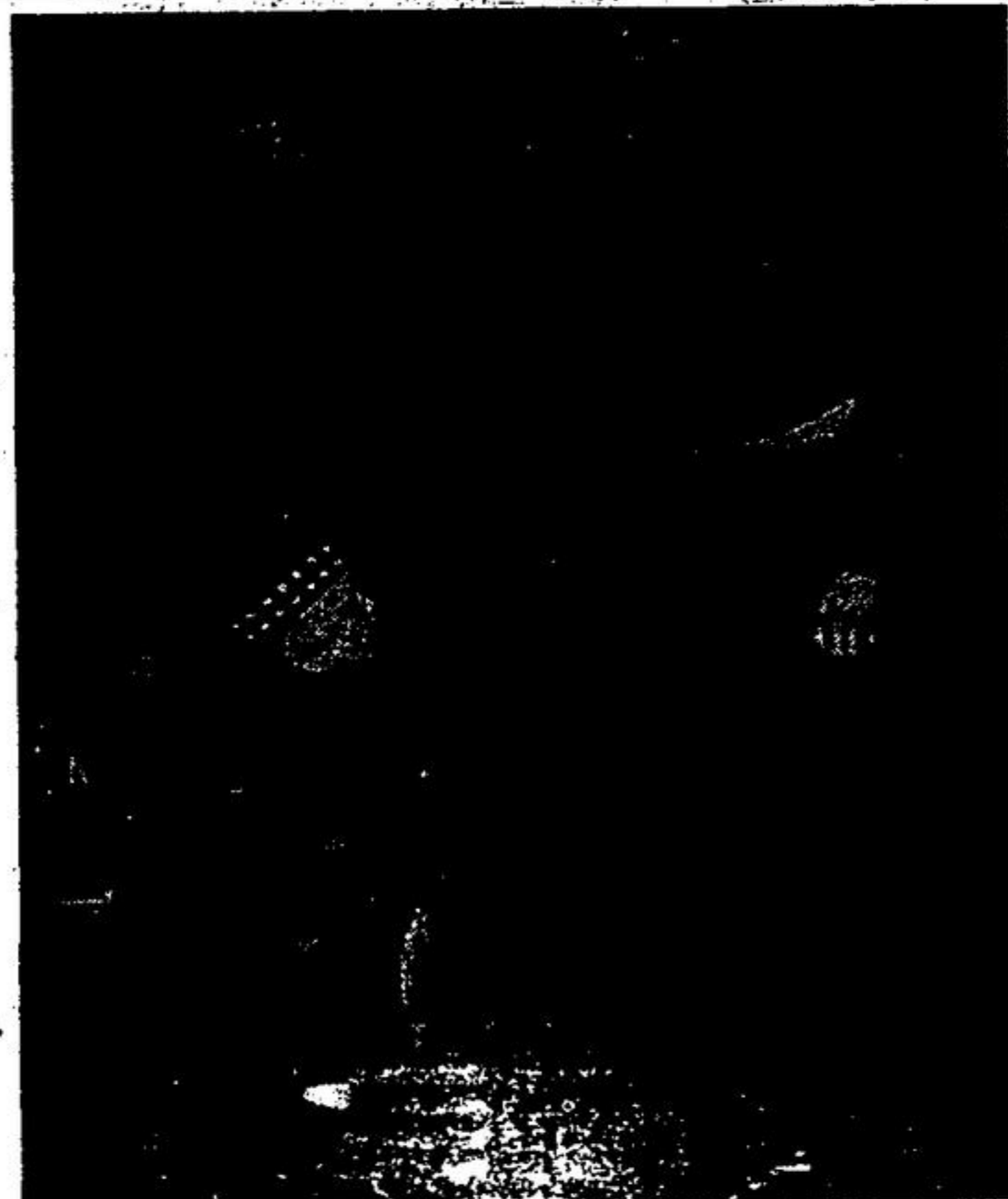
Boxing Day Holiday

Halton Municipalities Choose New Councils

Elections in most Halton municipalities registered small votes this year with the exception of Burlington which recorded heavy voting in a mayoralty contest.

Many offices were filled by acclamation. Esquimes Township had no election at all. All centres voted on December 3rd except Georgetown whose vote came one week later.

Oakville

Oakville's Mayor L. McArthur who was reeve last year received an acclamation and Deputy Reeve R. M. Wakely was also returned by acclamation. Councillor William Anderson defeated Councillor William S. Thomson for the reeveship. With one exception, Thomas Lindsay, the town has an entire new council. They are: Dr. Frederick Haldenby, a school trustee in 1953; James J. Holliday, contractor, F. W. Ferras, lawyer; William E. Ward, plumbing contractor; Frederick Tilley, manager; and Councillor Thomas Lindsay, insurance underwriter. Three of the 1953 council, Athol Blair, Elgin Bonus and Ernest Savin, were defeated, along with Allan Mason, James W. Snow, Donald Garfat and George Mullis.

Bronte

Reeve Alfred Jennings was acclaimed for a second term as Bronte's reeve. In the election for council, Robert Mason, merchant, led the polls, Councillor Thomas Millward was returned and two newcomers, Grant Bray, insurance agent, and Aubrey Pickard were also elected. Three 1953 councillors were defeated. Charles Livingstone, Mrs. Christopher Spensley, and Henry Twigg.

For school board, veteran Freeman Bray led the polls for another term as a trustee, and Mrs. Phyllis Stewart and Mrs. Dorothy Irvine were also elected. A 1953 trustee William Sargent, was defeated.

Trafalgar

Reeve Emerson Ford and Deputy Robert Marshall will return to county council from Trafalgar Township, both by acclamation. Voting is by wards in the township, and there were elections only in two of these. Councillors, Mrs. A. P. Miller and Donald Bath were elected over Edgar Bulmer and Mrs. Ernest Cudmore. Councillor Frank Stark, Ernest Henderson and Alex Phillips were acclaimed.

Acton

Though Acton had an election for mayor, the town is still short one councillor, despite two nomination meetings. Ted Tyler, a councillor and former mayor defeated Thomas Cooke in the only contest. Ratepayers approved increasing the number of P.U.C. commissioners from three to five also. By acclamation, J. J. Stewart and Ray Thompson return as reeve and deputy. At the first nomination meeting E. Froot and Councillors C. "Dude" Lindsay, A. Irwin and L. Wiecek were acclaimed. At a second meeting last week, despite six nominees, only John Hargrave

meeting will be held in the new year. E. Hufnagel was elected P.U.C. commissioner and T. Watson, W. Wolfe and M. Smith to the public school board.

Milton

The county town also found it hard to get councillors, although there was an election for reeve and mayor in Milton. A former mayor, Dr. C. H. Heslop defeated 1953 Reeve C. R. Anderson for the mayor's seat left vacant by the retirement of Mayor Frank Thompson. Dr. Carl Martin, member of North Halton High School Board and a former councillor is the new reeve, defeating F. W. McMaster in the election. The 1953 deputy reeve, Ross Pearen, retired from office to become a councillor and Councillor Sydney Childs succeeds him. Other councillors are R. C. Cunningham from the present council, C. Johnson, John Charlton, Robert Reid and Mr. Pearen. A nomination meeting to fill the vacant seat is scheduled for December 18th. J. M. Ledwith, Gordon Gowland and James Bell are public school board members, and John Rush a hydro commissioner.

Nelson

Nelson Township has a new reeve and deputy, George Brenholz and Edwin Leather. Reeve R. C. Small is retiring and Deputy Reeve John Atkinson, ran for council and headed the polls. Harold Adkins and Leonard Coulson were also elected. Unsuccessful candidates were Fred Walker and Warren McGiven. Ewart McKinnon and Mrs. Norma Dobson were elected school trustees defeating Mel Hood and Gordon Cartwright.

Burlington

Return of Mayor Ted Smith for a fourth term highlighted the Burlington election. Mr. Smith defeated Councillor Hugh Elsom by a decisive majority. Deputy Reeve Harry C. Wade returned for a second term, defeating a newcomer, Frank G. C. Darton. Reeve Robert Shannon has been given an acclamation. Councillors elected were A. M. Bateman, Fred Atkinson, and John W. Gordon of the present council, Arthur C. Mason, William Hewitt and John Kehoe. Defeated candidates were William Whittaker, William Lewis and Councillor Gordon Rusty.

Nassagaweya

With Reeve Stanley Norrish stepping down to a council seat, Archie Service is the new reeve in Nassagaweya Township. He defeated John Robertson in the only election in the township which saw other offices filled by acclamation. The four councillors are John Milne, Charles Thomson, Lloyd Chisholm, and Mr. Norrish. School board members are Horace Blyth, Stan Robinson and John McDougall.

Esquimes

Esquimes Township was the only one of Halton's ten municipalities which did not see any election this year. Warden George L. Leslie retired and Wilfrid Iain stepped in
