BIBLE SOCIETY MAN SPEAKS TO BAPTISTS
 The regular morning worship at the Baptist Church was conducted by Rev. A. J. Barker. Rev. J. Billingsley representative from the British and Foreign Bible Society was the guest preacher and took his sermon text from Psalm 119:130 "The entrance of thy word giveth light, it giveth understanding unto the simple," stressing God's power is at the heart of the Holy Bible, and it has power over the hearts of men. Ontario Seed Growers Prominent at Royal
 Ontario seed growers upheld the reputation of the province for high class seed at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair by winning two world championships, two other championships, seven reserve championships and twenty nine first prizes.
 Gabriel Kolometz, Dunning P.O., near Cochrane, won national recognition on his entry of Irish Cobbler potatoes. Another Cochrane farmer, Gustave Stein, Matheson, twice champion at Chicago, won the dry pea classes at the Royal this year. DePutter Brothers of Appin took the world crown in the soybean classes in which Ontario growers made a clean sweep. Edward Gardhouse, Unionville, took the championship of the three hay classes and John McMillan, Dalkeith, took similar honours in the grass seed classes.
 In the winter wheat classes, W. E. Breckon, Freeman, who won the very heavy white winter wheat class six years out of the last seven took the reserve championship in winter wheat. Frank Marritt and Son, Keswick, another prominent exhibitor and grower, took reserve honours in the six rowed barley classes. Ralph Moore & Sons, of Norwich, won reserve honours in sweet corn and H. Trahan, Paincourt, won reserve in the shelled corn classes. These are considered outstanding wins because of the keen competition from some of the best exhibitor from Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois.
 Arthur H. Budarick, Palmer Rapids, a former potato king, took reserve honours this year in potatoes.
 Ontario growers made a clean sweep of all prizes in soft winter wheat, alfalfa hay, red clover hay, and in the 4H Club corn classes. Other first prize winners include: white spring wheat, Geo. Humphries, Castelford; beans, AOV, R. Howard Ferguson, North Augusta; sunflowers, Nicholas Durrer, Mildmay; flint ear corn, Wesley, Maynard, Blenheim; orchard grass, W. B.
