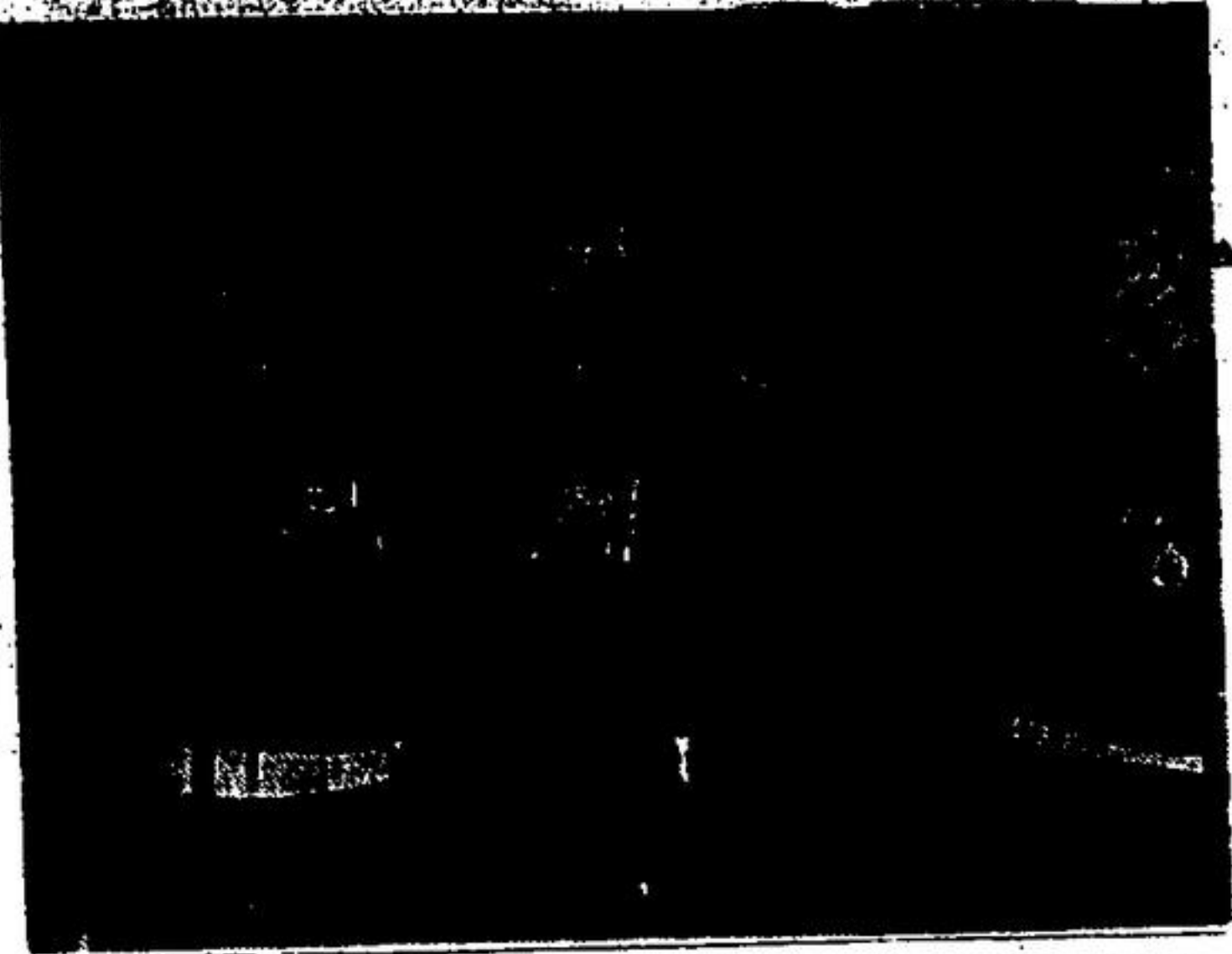

The main purpose of the Plan Service is to develop an effective and workable system of Farm Building Plans and labour saving equipment, that will be applicable and useful in all parts of Canada. The program is broken down into 8 divisions:
1, Beef Cattle Housing; 2, Dairy Cattle Housing; 3, Hog Housing; 4, Sheep Housing; 5, Poultry Housing; 6, Fruit and Vegetable Storage; 7, Grain Storage; 8, Special Buildings.
At the moment, however, the only set of plans available pertain to Beef Cattle Housing.

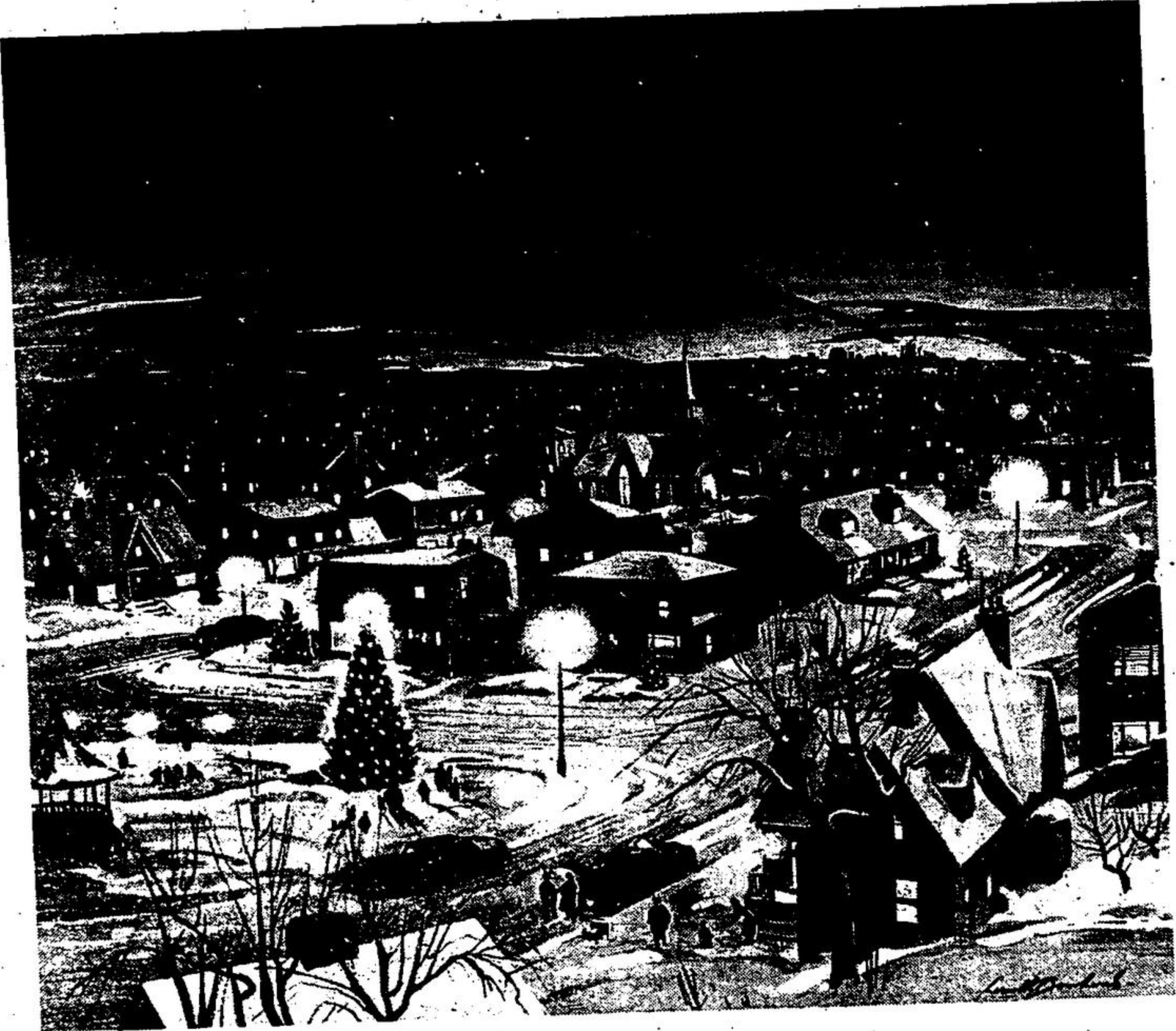
