AVERAGE \$312 FOR HAYS HOLSTEIN SALE

The sixth annual Hays Anniversary of Holsteins was held December 1st at Oakville, Ontario, with fifty three head bringing the excellent total of \$16,540, for a general

average of \$312. These included 24 head from the herd of W. D. Brooks, Brantford. Top price was \$1000 paid by G. E. McKay of Schomberg, to Brooks for Farrington Texal Dixie, a five year old cow classified Very Good in Selective Registration, who was also first prize

winner in the three-year-old milking class at the CNE in 1951. She is a daughter of the XXX bull Paul Texal Rag Apple. McKay also paid \$725 to J. Grauer and Sons, Ltd. of Vancouver, BC, for Frasea Ormsby Ideal, who was the first prize four year old at the Pacific National Exhibition at Vancouver this year. In addition, McKay also paid \$450 to Frank G. Stark & Sons, Milton, for a 3 year old and \$360 to E. Gordon Atkinson, Barrie, for a five year old cow.

Twenty two milking females averaged \$321, fourteen breed heifers, \$305; fifteen open heifers \$255; and two heifer calves, \$212.

Other good prices included \$430, paid by John Williams, Meadowdale, for a 3 year old; \$375 paid by G. W. Bussell, Hornby, for a bred heifer; \$375 paid by Karl Hyatt, Norval, for a milking female; \$300 paid by Leonard R. Verner, Bolton, for a bred heifer; \$300 paid by Harold Hammond, Caledon, for a milking female; and \$310 paid by Boris Trifonoff, Milton for a milking female.
