John Pallett Peel Conservative Choice

With the blessing of the county Conservatives' elder statesman, Thomas L. Kennedy, and the unanimous support of the more than 250 people who braved the year's first snowstorm to attend the meeting, John Pallett, 32 year old Port Credit lawyer, was chosen to carry the Progressive-Conservative banner in the forthcoming Peel County by-election.

Left vacant by the death last September of Gordon Graydon, perennial member for Peel, the seat represents a traditional Conservative stronghold, with continuous representation at Ottawa by that party since the early 1900's.

Two candidates were named for the nomination, Bert C. Smith, Port Credit newspaper proprietor declining the nomination in favour of Mr. Pallett.

In his remarks in support of Mr. Pallett, Mr. Smith told the meeting that he will be asking for support about two years from now, when he will stand for the P.C. nomination, to the Ontario Legislature.

Thanking the meeting for the nomination, John Pallett said "I deeply appreciate the honour that you have given me in allowing me to represent you."

Speaking feelingly of the late Gordon Graydon, he told the audience "To follow that man is a great honour and a responsibility. He showed us how a county should be represented. I don't expect to do it immediately, but I hope to do it in the future."

He pointed out that he is a member of a good farm family and has a good farm background. During his service overseas he was enabled to get to know about other countries, and also to find out about people.

"I know people," he said. "I think the reason that you are letting me stand is that I am 32 years of age, and have a good solid pair of legs, which will help me to go around

and knock on every door in the county."

"When I am elected," he asserted, "I will go down to Ottawa for there is one problem that must be laid on the government's doorstep, — education."

Regardless of obscure clauses in the British North American Act, the candidate said, "they can give grants to education if they want to. They have billions for defence. The best defence against Communism in education, and we are going to get some of those billions."

The chairman of the meeting, W. J. Abell, of Brampton, then declared Mr. Pallett the official candidate of the Progressive Conservative party in Peel County.

Hon. T. L. Kennedy, former Ontario premier and Minister of Agriculture told the meeting "Like the rest of you, I feel very happy about tonight. I prophesy that John Pallett will get the greatest majority that a man ever got in the history of Peel County."

The new P.C. standard-bearer for Peel is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Leslie H. Pallett of Dixie, where he was born.

Dr. G. D. Stirk, Brampton veterinary surgeon, who nominated him told the meeting that Mr. Pallett is a veteran of World War II and was discharged from the service with the rank of captain, after being mentioned in despatches.

He is a member of the board of managers of the Dixie Presbyterian Church, a member of the Credit Valley Lions Club, a member of the South Peel Hospital Board, and a solicitor for the South Peel Board of Education. He is also a member of the Canadian Legion and of the Army, Navy and Air Force Veterans of Canada.

Educated at Dixie public schools, he later attended Port Credit High School and Victoria College, Toronto.

He was called to the bar in June, 1948, after graduating from Osgoode Hall.

After practising a year with a Toronto firm, he went into a legal partnership with his brother, Leslie Pallett, at Port Credit.

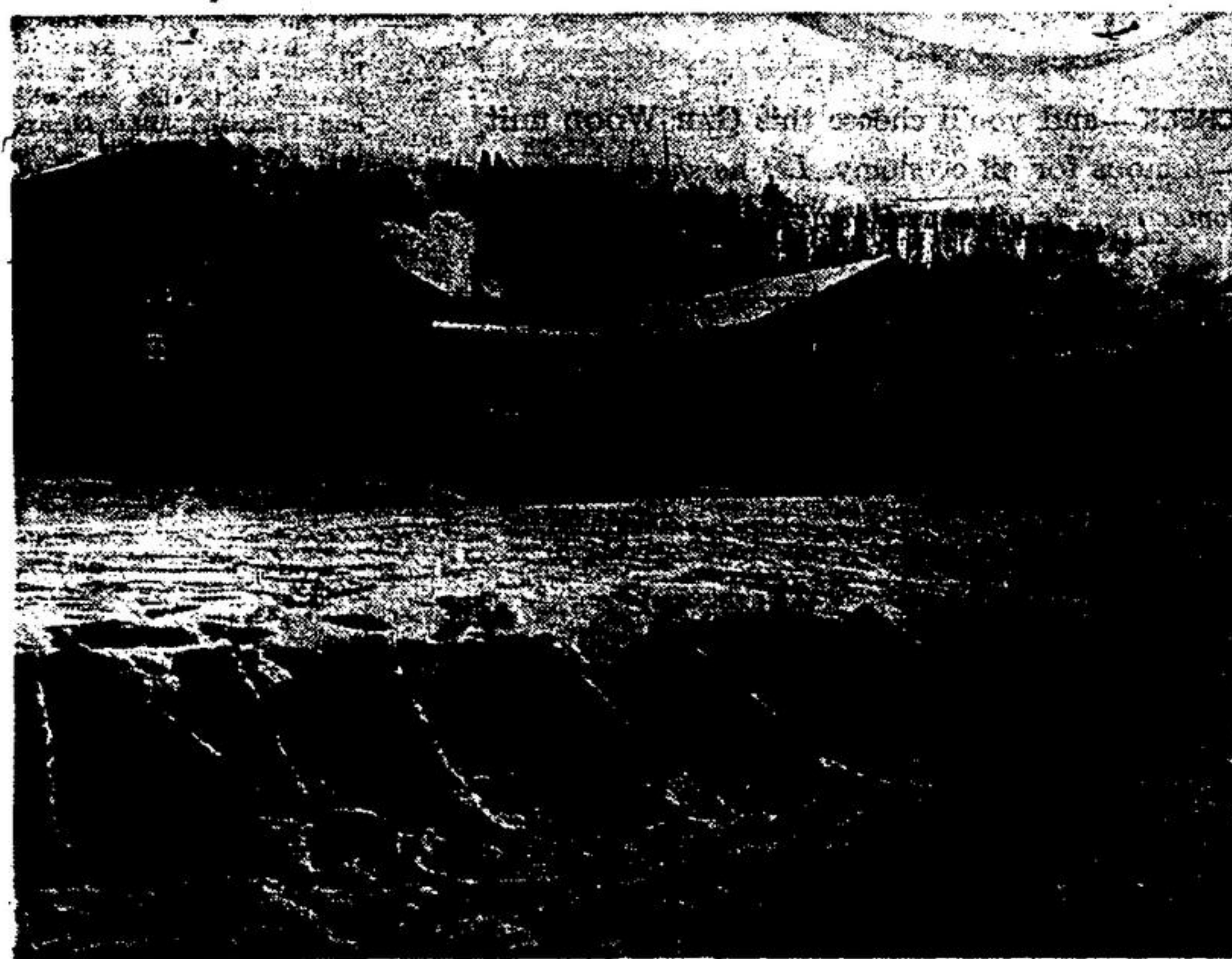
