Mr Shaw indicated that the current production of passenger cars and trucks can be doubled when the additional body-building, engine manufacturing and parts-making facilities, new under construction, are completed at the end of 1954 and carly 1955

By that time Chrysler of Canada will have spent approximately \$54,-000,000 since the close of World War-II in extending its manufacturing facilities at Windsor and building new parts ; lants to serve the Maritimes and the West.
