### Was Past Noble Grand Of Oddfellows Lodge

Seriously ill with heart trouble since New Year's day, Charles Eldridge Day, 63, died at his home, 38 Victoria Street, on Saturday.

A Smith & Stone employee for twelve years, he had previously worked in the construction business with his brother-in-law, Syd MacKenzie, and before that was a public school teacher.

Mr. Day was born in Norval where his father operated a blacksmith shop for over sixty years. He was the son of the late George Day and Annie Huggard. He attended Norval Public School and Georgetown High School, and after graduating from Hamilton Normal School he taught at Grimsby, Huttonville and at Biggar, Saskatchewan. Since going to Smith & Stone he had worked in the punch press and assembly departments.

A prominent Oddfellow, he belonged to Milton Chapter of the lodge and was also associated with Orion Lodge in town and was a Past Noble Grand. He was a member of the Anglican Church.

Surviving are his wife, Maria J. McMenemy, three brothers and three sisters, George of Norval, Mrs. S. C. MacKenzie (Laura), Ancaster, Mrs. George Pritchard (Alice), Miss Eva Day, Gordon A. Day and Victor L. Day, Toronto.

Thompson conducted the funeral service yesterday at the McClure Funeral Home at the graveside in Hillcrest Cemetery, Norval, members of the Oddfellows Lodge conducted their service, which was in charge of Fred Johnson, Noble Grand, and Corey Herrington, Jr., chaplain. ### District Folk Attend Ag.-Fed. Convention

A full 4-day program drew hundreds of delegates to the Ontario Federation of Agriculture convention in Toronto last week, including from this district Mrs. J. L. Ellerby, Mrs. George Somerville and Mac Sprawl.

A Halton man, William Hume, R. 2, Milton, was named to the provincial board, and several Halton young people participated in music contests and public speaking. Waterloo, York and Haldimand counties took honours in the musical divisions and Leonard Hopkins, Argyle, was chosen top orator among the junior farmers.

The conference was held at the King Edward Hotel. Premier Leslie Frost spoke to over 800 who attended the Wednesday dinner. J. A. Ferguson, Port Stanley, is the new provincial president, and Lloyd Jasper, Mildmay, and Gordon Greer, City View, are vice presidents.

A feature of the general sessions was a panel discussion on new marketing trends, in which such men as J. C. Brodrick, a past president, Dairy Commissioner Everett Biggs, Mr. Porter from the Ottawa Marketing Service, and Charles McGuinness and J. D. Hunt, representing hog and cheese producers, participated.

Some 49 resolutions were considered by the conference, dealing with a variety of subjects like income tax, conservation, farm machinery, school buses and marketing.

Licensing of farm tractors was a hot issue, and eradication of livestock diseases was one of the major items.

Junior Farmers discussed farm organization, while wife and succession duties was one of the high-light subjects at the ladies' meeting. Mrs. George Weir, Bradford is provincial ladies' chairman, and Mrs. Lealand Pound, Ancaster, secretary.

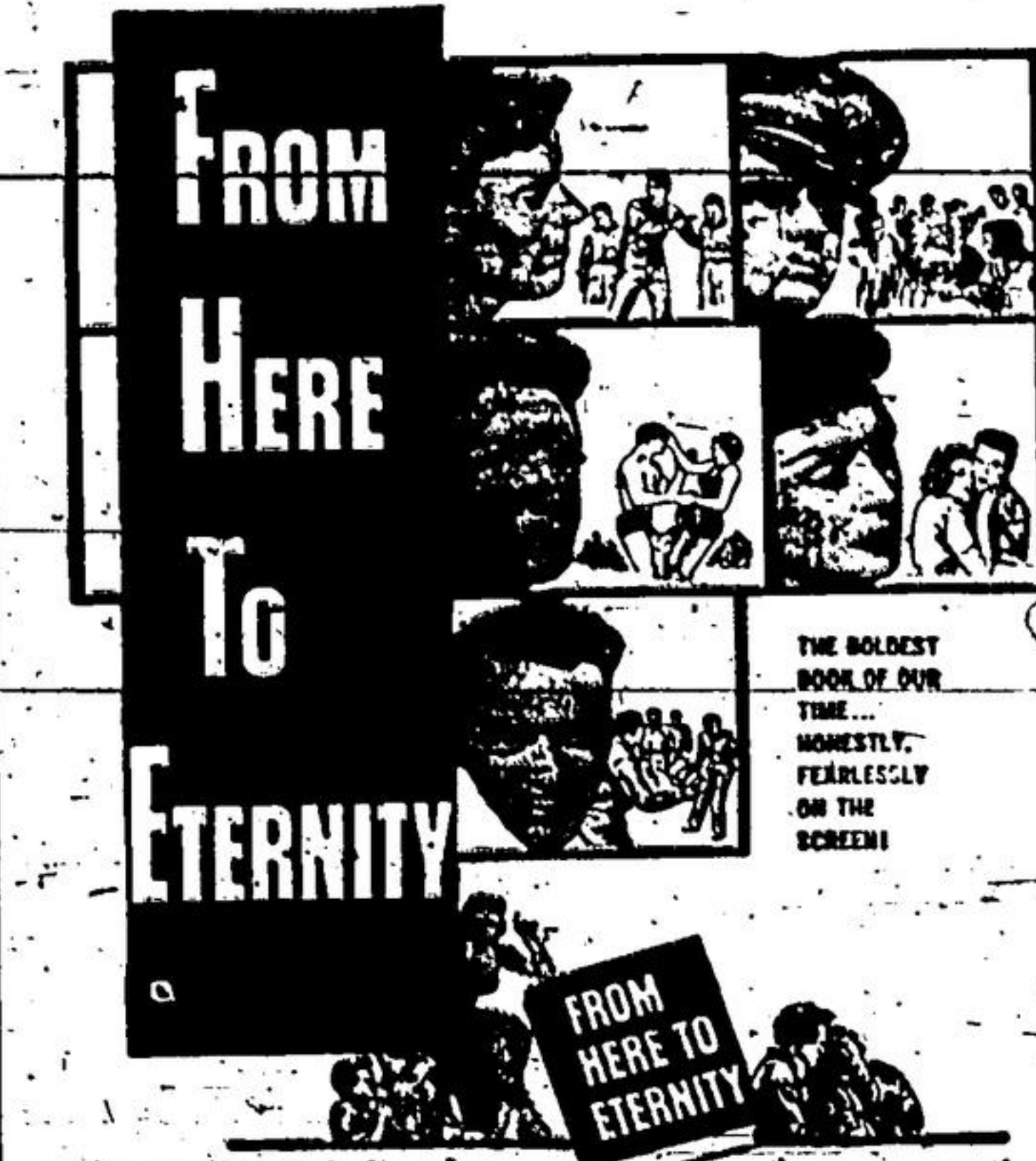
