**Industrial Executive Hears Player Protest**

Smith & Stone dropped a 4-2 decision to the Combines and as a result they lodged a protest with league president George Louth immediately after Sunday's game. Manager Tom Beckett informed those concerned between the 2nd and 3rd periods his club was protesting the use of Tucker by the Combines. Manager Elmer Hill and coach Scotty Patterson scouted when informed of the move by the Smith and Stone management. Tucker, who had played several games, is the centre of attraction because his name failed to appear on the final roster, on which Smith and Stone were basing their protest. It was first decided by the League executive to allow each team 15 players
