Mr. Barker stated the great danger in religious life is too much talk which is symbolic of the inner spirit. Language is very essential, it is the glory of human life, it is the measure of the intellect of vener; Mrs. R. Martin, membership, people, but yet it can be overdone. We should at all times discipline ourselves to our own means of communication. Upon entering the sanctuary of a church we need (1) relax and be still in body, (2) rest Scouts! Don't forget only two the mind, (3) think about God, (4) pray for the people round about you and also yourself that God's love may overwhelm your heart. When we have done these things we have experienced the Lord in silent spirit. Habakkuk telis us "The Lord is in His Holy Temple, let all the earth keep silent before Him." Men should forget them-All Scouts and Cubs are to selves, seek God and wait upon Him in silent adoration. Until a quietness of spirit is developed true worship is never known. Our thoughts should be directed upon His grace, His love and His holiness.
