**Watkins is Named Moscow Ambassador**

Appointment of John B. C. Watkins as ambassador to Russia was announced last week by the External Affairs Department.

Mr. Watkins, now Canadian Minister in Norway and Iceland will assume his new post March 1st. He will be the first Canadian ambassador to Moscow since 1946 when, Gans Willgress was a withdrawn at the time of the Russian spy probe in Canada.

Mr. Watkins is one of the Georgetown district's most outstanding native sons. The 31-year-old bachelor spent his boyhood at Norval Station, and after graduation from the University of Toronto worked with the American-Scandinavian Foundation in New York, later teaching at the University of Manitoba. He will not be a stranger in Russia as he served as charge d'affaires there from 1948 to 1951.

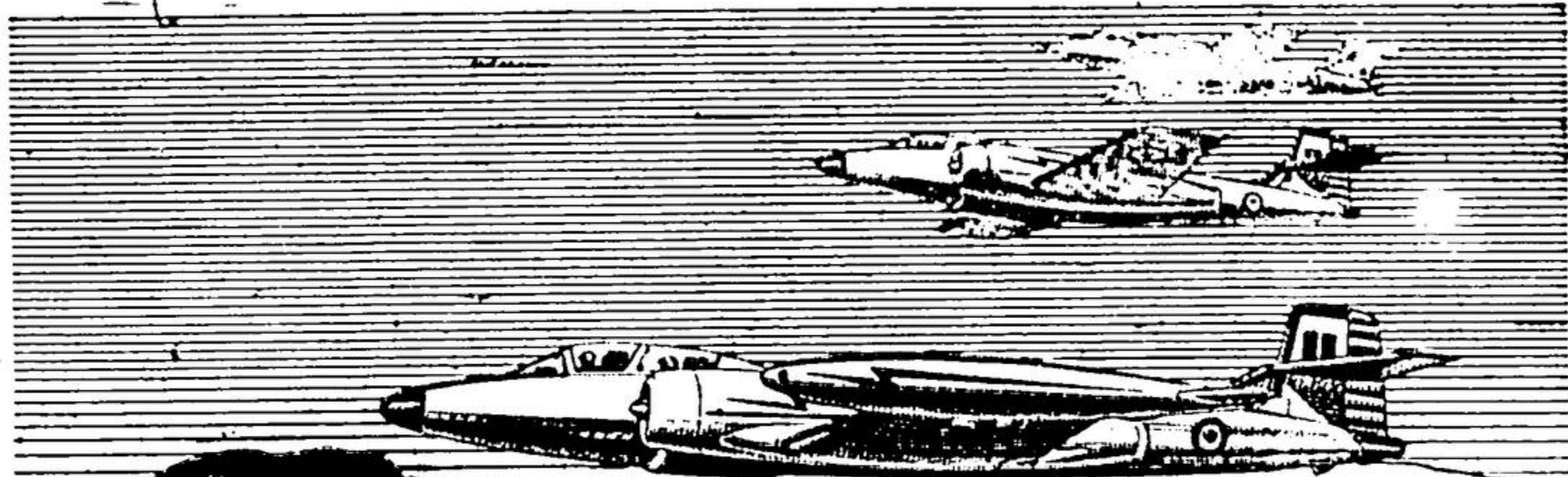

**Frank Pelletterio was Prominent Holstein Man**

Frank Pelletterio, 70, vice-president of Ashville Farms Limited, and prominent pure bred Holstein cattle breeder in Halton county, died January 21st at Milton Private hospital. He became ill early this month. Mr. Pelletterio took a keen interest and an active part in community and county affairs and won the premier exhibitor award for 1952 and 1953 at the Halton Black and White shows held in Milton.

He was born in New York city and came to Canada at the age of seven, with his parents. For 35 years he resided in York county and in 1930 moved to Halton county. He had incorporated his farm and became its senior partner with his sons Joseph as president and George, secretary-manager.

Mr. Pelletterio was the first breeder of Holsteins in Halton county to bring the champion ribbon from the Canadian National

member of the Halton Holstein Breeders' Club for many years and at one time was also a member of the Halton Milk Producers' Association.

Besides Joseph and George, he is survived by his sons, David of Milton and John and Robert, both of Toronto. There are four daughters, Miss Ann at home; Mrs. Joseph DeMols (Rose), Lakeview; Mrs. Samuel Reid (Camilla), Trafalgar township, and Mrs. B. Albert Oates (Evelyn) of Bronte.

One brother, Joseph Pelletterio, resides in Maple, Ont., and a sister, Mrs. Frank Angotti, of Toronto, also survives him. There are 19 grandchildren. Mrs. Pelletterio, who was the former Maria Antonette Sansone, died in 1943. The service was held at St. Luke's Anglican church, Palumbo, with burial in St. Luke's cemetery.
