The group plan to meet at Stewarttown Hall, where Professor A. C. Robertson, an expert on Farm Family Business Arrangements, Farm Finance, Credit, and Income Tax, etc., will lead the discussion. Participants will bring lunch, after which Professor Pos of the Agricultural Engineering Department of the O.A.C. will lead a discussion on Stable Planning. The day's programme will also include a visit to the new A. J. Ruddell & Son barn, at Ashgrove. On this stable, as yet not completed, Prof. Pos will offer alternate plans for both Loose Housing and the conventional tie-up type of stable.

The following day, the young men of South Halton will meet at the Farmers Bldg., Milton, where Prof. Art Robertson will again lead in a discussion on "The Young Man Starts Farming". This will include points to keep in mind in selecting a farm, how to finance it; division of capital investment between land and buildings, farm equipment and livestock.

SCOUTS MOVIE GUESTS OF THEATRE MANAGER

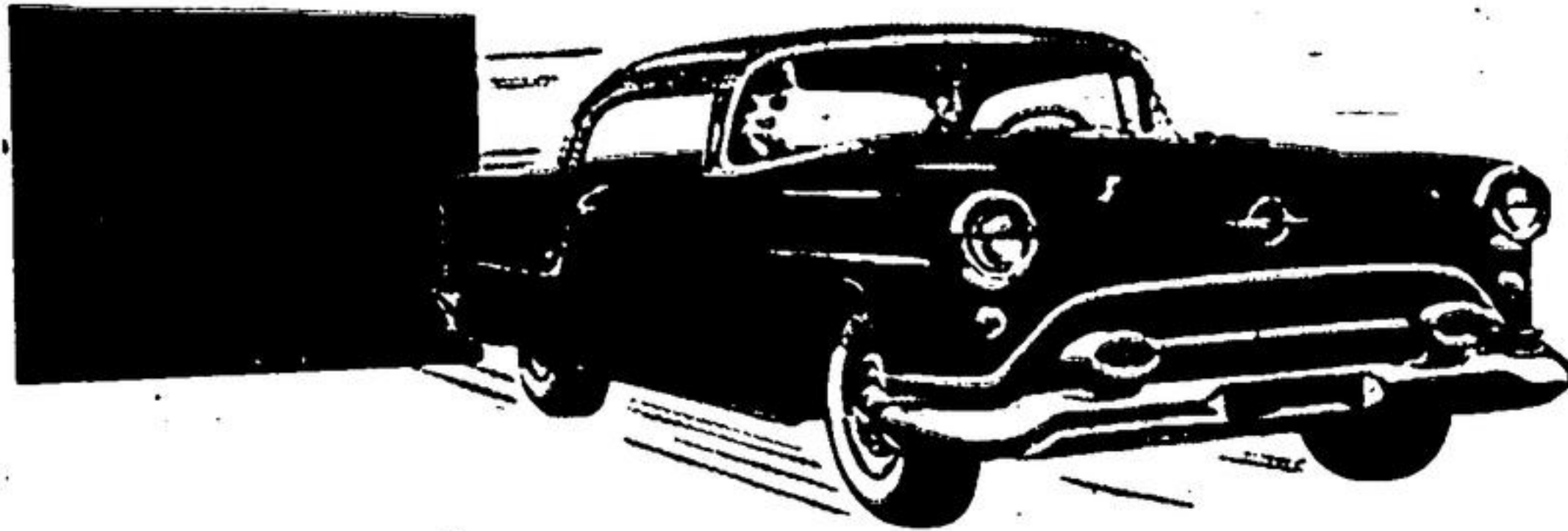

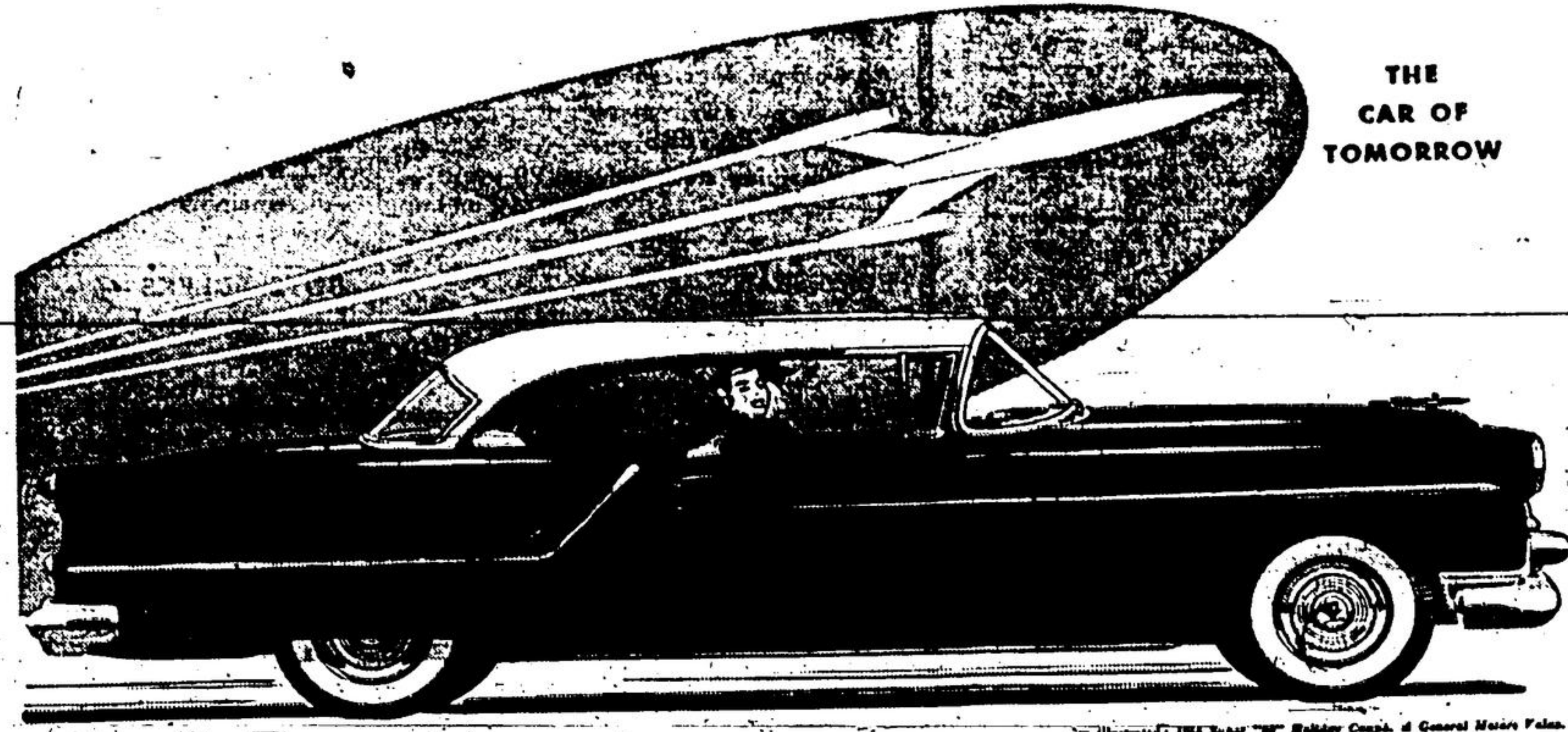
Scout flags and paraphernalia were on display in the lobby of the theatre.

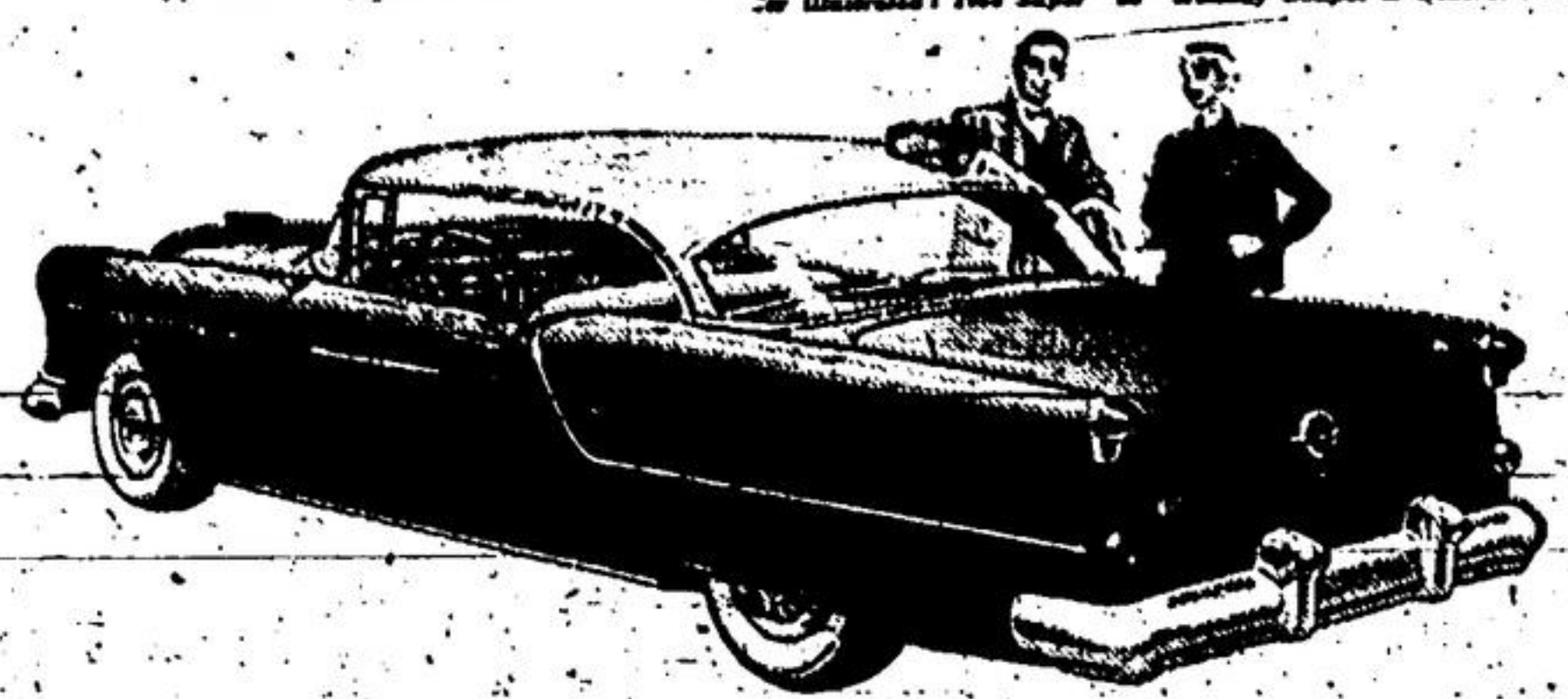
