Better Artificial Limb Made for War Amputees

Soldiers who have lost hands in the Korea fighting are fitted with a new type of artificial limb that provides better control and grasping power.

After trial on a few selected cases the number of arm amputees now fitted with the new limb has increased to 28. The most recent cases were Korean casualties. During and after the last war, most of the amputees considered hooks as the best substitute for a hand. They usually were made of prongs. Multiple rubber bands or springs were used to provide the closing action. The prong-type hooks, however, provide no control over the amount of pressure which the amputee might apply to any object grasped.

The newer limb—either artificial hands or hooks—can be activated by arm muscles themselves. A surgical technique has been developed to attach the muscles to the device, giving the amputee better control with less conspicuous movements.

The surgeon incorporates a loop of skin from the arm into the muscle which is drawn through a puncture wound of the stump. The control cable, which works the device, is attached to this loop of skin and muscle by a plastic pin.

Volcano a Relief Valve For Earth's Pressures

Scientists attribute the causes of volcanoes to the fact that rocks of the Earth become hotter with depth, and eventually get so hot that they would melt were it not for the great pressure of the overlying layers. Sometimes this pressure may be relieved locally and temporarily and then the hot rock does melt.

This also allows steam and gases contained in the rock to exert tremendous pressure on the surrounding rock walls. If a vent is found to the surface the molten rock and associated gases will escape. Perhaps the fluid extrudes quietly and lava flows without violence, but with a large proportion of included gases, the eruption may be violent and break the surface with explosive force.

Hardened lava and accumulated ash may build up a cone which finally is sealed off by congealed lava. Perhaps underground pressure will build up again and there follows a new period of activity. Thus, it is seen, volcanoes are really safety valves that relieve gas pressures built up inside the Earth.

For A Very Young Lady

A clothes closet designed for a very young lady—one that can grow up as she does—has a low rod that can be raised as dresses and coats are lengthened. It also has easily-reached compartments for underthings, sweaters and sleepers so that she can learn to put everything in its place. There is a section, too, for hats and berets. On one of the double doors is a hook for her nightgowns and a rack for her bedroom slippers. Above them, on a painted blue background, snail a new moon and silver stars, indicating that the garment below is for night time. On the second door is painted the rising sun, a reminder that the bathrobe hung beneath it is for morning wear. Painted on each compartment are the names of the garments to be found within.

Pocketbook Cooperation

Nowadays you pay less for Venetian blinds because of the quality finishes developed by industrial finish engineers. Manufacturers can now finish a coil of flat steel or aluminum—or long strips of wood—at one time. These strips, after being coated with modern, fast-drying flexible finishes, are cut into exact length, thus reducing production costs.

Telephone Wires

Iron wire was used on early telephone lines, but it was not the best conductor. Copper was much better, but in 1878-1880 was too soft to be strung outdoors. So one telephone man put in about five years developing hard-drawn copper wire, which had the conductivity of copper with almost the tensile strength of iron.

Atomic Energy In Sun

Scientists believe that the sun (like other stars) keeps going by a process in which four nuclei of hydrogen atoms combine to form one nucleus of a helium atom, and by which atomic energy is released near the Sun's center. This energy reaches the solar surface and is radiated as light and heat, some reaching the earth. All the energy we use originates in this way.
