Always a top performer and one of the lengue's top scorers it will be a loss to the league as well as the Combines, if action is taken again him. Erin called upon him early in the season to play for them and they were going to enter in the Ontario Rural Hockey league as a rural team. There is nothing in the rules of the league here to prevent a player from playing for such and it may been that linines figured he was not breaking any rules by playing there, but it seems Erin made the switch from rural to Junior D after they got going and this is the point the league wish to clear up. It all depends on whether Erin played more than three games Junior, with Haines in the line-up. If he has played more than three games the rule says he is out but if he played say three games with Erin as a rural team and three games as a Junior team he would be allowed to play in this league providing he doesn't play another game for Erin. On the other hand if he has played four games as a Junior for Erin and only 2 games as rural he has broken the rule.

It was noticeable at the meeting the other members of the executive did not want to rule too hastily in this case. Haines has always been a good sport and a keen competitor and it is very unlikely he would deliberately break the ruled. show his good faith to his team and the league he left the Erin club to devote his talent to his own team, If this league and the Combines didn't mean anything to him isn't likely he would give up Junfor hockey to play here. The league has a hard enough time keeping the top notch players from going to the Intermediates and other OHA clubs so why let a player go (if he has broken the rule) when he wants to stay.

"We pride ourselves on being progressive in Canada, but we are way behind Europe in public santtation." said reave Stan Allen, in dischising public tollets at Mon-

day's council meeting. The discussion came after a latter from the county health inspector, who had been asked to investigate a nuisance reported behind buildings on Main Street. The inspector had found that the public had been using a certain location. and intimated that council might consider providing suitable facili-

"I admit that public tollets in France are just that," said Reeve Allen, with tongue in cheek, "and you get a view of heads and feet but at least the Parisiennes realize the necessity of providing something. In Paris lady attendants look after the premises and earn their living from tips and sale of paper."

Mayor Armstrong, while recognizing the need, said he feared abuse of premises and the cost of maintaining them.

"I've lived in two towns where they had them," said Cr. Irwin Noble, "and while they have not been perfect. It's not impossible to control the situation."

Deputy Reev Allan Norton is all for some facilities. "There aren't too many even in business places," he said, "and I'll go on record as saying people are welcome to use the facilities in my store at any time until something more public is provided."

Council agreed that it would not work to throw open to the public the present toilets in the Municipal Building, but several said some thought should be given to a solution. Cr. Lyons' property committee was asked to give it some study.
