

Toronto robbery last week. Three unarmed men bound and gagged Mr. Malina in his Dundas St W. jewelery store in Toronto and took \$4000 in watches and rings. Mr Malina was cut about . the hands and face when the bandits . roughed him up" as they were binding him about the hands-and-

They entered the store a few minutes after the store was opened in the morning and forced the proprietor to open the safe on the threat of death. He was then pushed to the floor and tied up. From the safe, the bandits took a bag filled with 50 watches, two boxes of jewelery and 100 rings off two trays. They also took \$30 from Mr. Malina's pocket.
