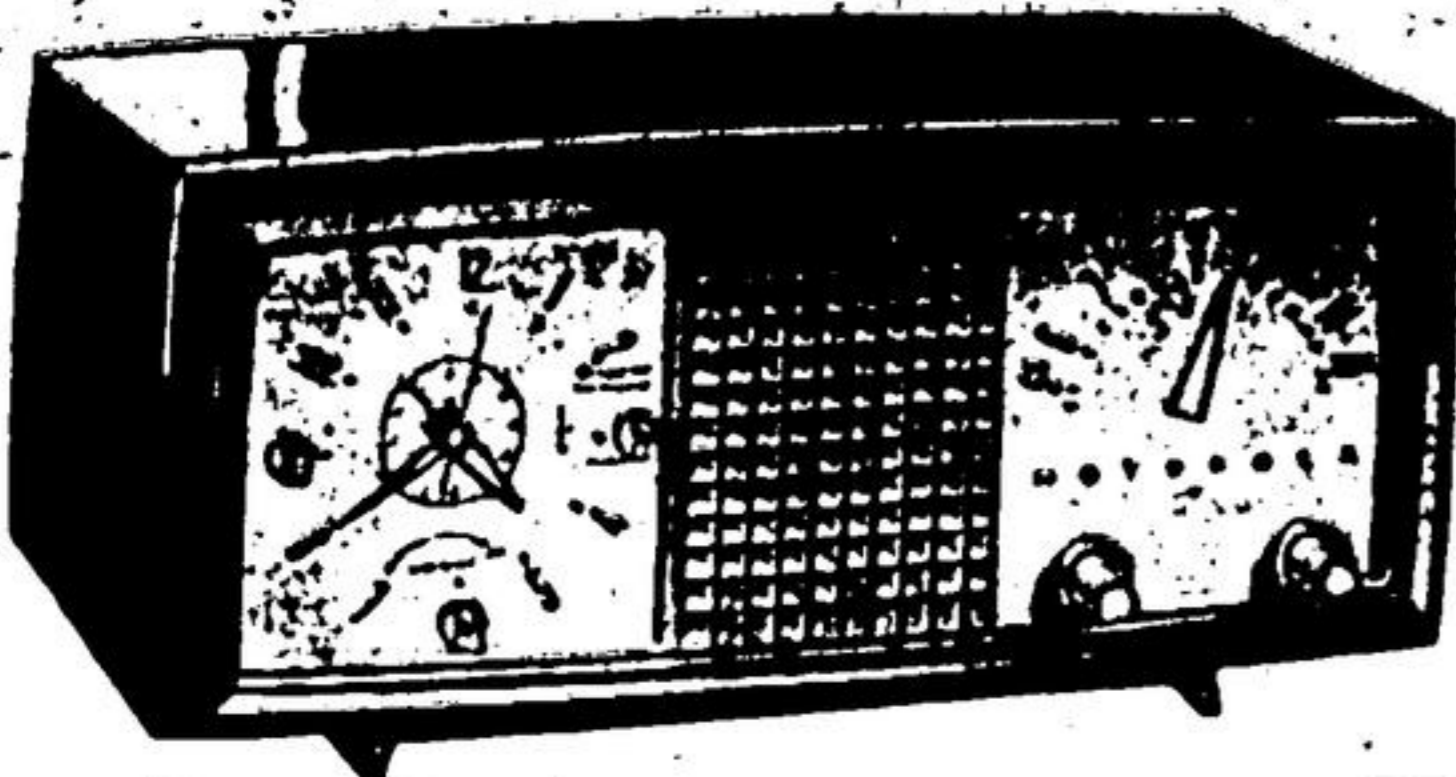

MONDAY, FEBRUARY 1st

The road superintendent was asked to advertise for tenders for supplying, crushing and delivering 18,000 cubic yards of gravel for township roads in 1954.

Tenders are also being asked for the hourly use of a dump truck, and for use of a front end loader, to be bid on a load basis.

Mrs. Francis Thompson was appointed to Esquensing Community Hall Board, replacing Mrs. Vern Pickett.

At a court of revision which preceded the council meeting, a number of tax refunds were made, as follows:

J. J. Thompson, building removed, \$5.74; A. J. Ruddell, building burned, \$10.74; William Hyatt, building burned, \$12.60; Wm. Schenk, wrongly assessed, \$16.53; George Brown, building removed, \$6.31; Campbell Sinclair, lease ended on UCC land, \$18.43; Harry R. Brown, 1953 taxes overpaid, \$2.00; John Norton, 1952 taxes overpaid, \$10.00; 1953 taxes on St. Paul's Parish Hall, Norval, were written off, and Upper Canada College land assessed to Arthur Shain on the 1953 roll was transferred to the exempt column. Taxes from 1949 to 1953 on property which cannot be found, assessed to Mrs. A. M. Ballantine, were written off \$29.39, and \$5.38 business tax of John Perry, whereabouts unknown, were written off.

Reeve Bird and Councillor Wilson were appointed township representatives to Esquensing Fire Area No. 1; Councillor Currie to Milton Fire Area No. 2; and Deputy Reeve Linham and Councillor Sinclair to Esquensing Fire Area No. 3.

Former Local Jeweler
Robbed in Toronto

A former Georgetown jeweler, Marjan Malina, 75, was victim of a Toronto robbery last week.

Three unarmed men bound and gagged Mr. Malina in his Dundas St. W. jewelry store in Toronto and took \$4000 in watches and rings. Mr. Malina was cut about the hands and face when the bandits "roughed him up" as they were binding him about the hands and feet.

They entered the store a few minutes after the store was opened in the morning and forced the proprietor to open the safe on the threat of death. He was then pushed to the floor and tied up. From the safe, the bandits took a bag filled with 50 watches, two boxes of jewelry and 100 rings off two trays. They also took \$30 from Mr. Malina's pocket.

The robbery victim operated a jewelry store here for several years, his shop being located in the O'Neill block in part of what is now Carroll's store.
