**Erin Nonagenarian  
Once Lived Here**

An Erin nonagenarian who lived for a few years in Georgetown, C. E. McMillan, 92, was buried in Erin Cemetery on January 27th. He died on January 25th at the home of his son, Elmer, in Erin.

Mr. McMillan lived at the home of Mrs. Margaret Sheffield, Main Street North, while he was a resident here, and was a familiar figure on Main Street on his daily walk downtown.

He was born near Erin and spent the greater part of his life farming. He was fond of horses and owned some show and racehorses. In 1910 he moved to Erin where he operated an implement business. He later took up real estate selling and was quite active until a few years before his death.

He was a lover of music, and started to play the violin when he was seven years old. He never took lessons but his ear for music made him an outstanding old time fiddler and in his young days he played for many country dances. He competed at the CNE for old time fiddlers and won seven gold medals. Later he was made judge for the old-time fiddlers at the exhibition.

He was twice married. His first wife was Margaret Lefler who predeceased him in 1904. He later married Mary Jane Murphy, who predeceased him in 1936.

He is survived by two sons Elmer on the homestead and Theodore of Port Dover. There are five grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren; also one sister, Mrs. Donner of Toronto.
