Hydro Chairman New President of C.N.E.

The election of Robert H. Saunders as president of the Canadian National Exhibition for the ensuing year was announced, following the 1954 Inaugural meeting of the Canadian National Exhibition Association at Toronto's City Hall. Widely known as Ontario's hydro chairman and C.N.E.'s first vice president, Mr. Saunders succeeds J. A. Northey, president during 1952-53.

The new president brings to office an extensive background of Canadian National Exhibition activity — as a competitor, as an exhibitor, as an executive official, as an ardent enthusiast of paddling and other water sports. Mr. Saunders has participated in former Canadian National Exhibition paddling competitions and has also served as the chairman of the exhibition's sports committee. During the past year he was instrumental in organizing sports for the Canadian Olympic Training Camp to be held annually at the C.N.E. grounds. Athletes from all Canadian provinces will be invited to compete.

As chairman of Ontario Hydro since March, 1948, (following his election as Mayor of Toronto for a fourth term), Mr. Saunders has taken a very active interest in exhibits of the electrical industry. Dur-

ing 1952 largely through his efforts the "Hydro Building" was established for Ontario Hydro and Toronto Hydro displays, using the facilities of the former Railways Building.

A native of Toronto who has served his city in many responsible capacities, Mr. Saunders, who is a Queen's Council, has gained renown both at home and abroad as a business and public speaker. Mr. and Mrs. Saunders have one daughter, Betty, now attending the University of Toronto.

The year 1954 promises to be one of the most successful in Canadian National Exhibition history. The new Food Products Building was recently dedicated and will be available for use this year. There will be displays of interest to rural people pointing out the prominent role of agriculture in the life and economy of Ontario. An outstanding sports program has been arranged and competitors from all across Canada will take part. Stars of the grandstand show will be the famous Roy Rogers and his amazing horse "Trigger," Rogers' wife, Dale Evans, and her horse, "Buttermilk", and a fine troupe of performers. For young and old alike the midway will offer greater thrills and enjoyment.

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Reeve Urges Georgetown Continue Rent Control

Reeve Stan Allen made an earnest plea at Georgetown council meeting a week ago Monday to have the town continue rent controls when government control ends in March.

"I think the federal government, and the provincial government in its turn, have neglected their duty in dropping controls," said the reeve. "Two people have already asked me what the town is going to do, and it has no connection with politics because I know they are not political supporters of mine." (Reeve Allen was CCF candidate in the 1953 federal election.)

Reeve Allen strongly urged council to give some consideration to having rent control on a municipal level, as the law allows, with council appointing a local rent control board.

"Such control will only hurt people who deserve to be hurt," he said, indicating that any landlord who is fair is allowed a generous rent.

Mayor Armstrong suggested that any discussion on the matter be held over until a council meeting on February 15th.

"I realize the dropping of rent control would have ill effects on some people, and yet it appears that setting up a board would be costly and hard to administer," he said. The mayor said that very few towns appear to be giving con-

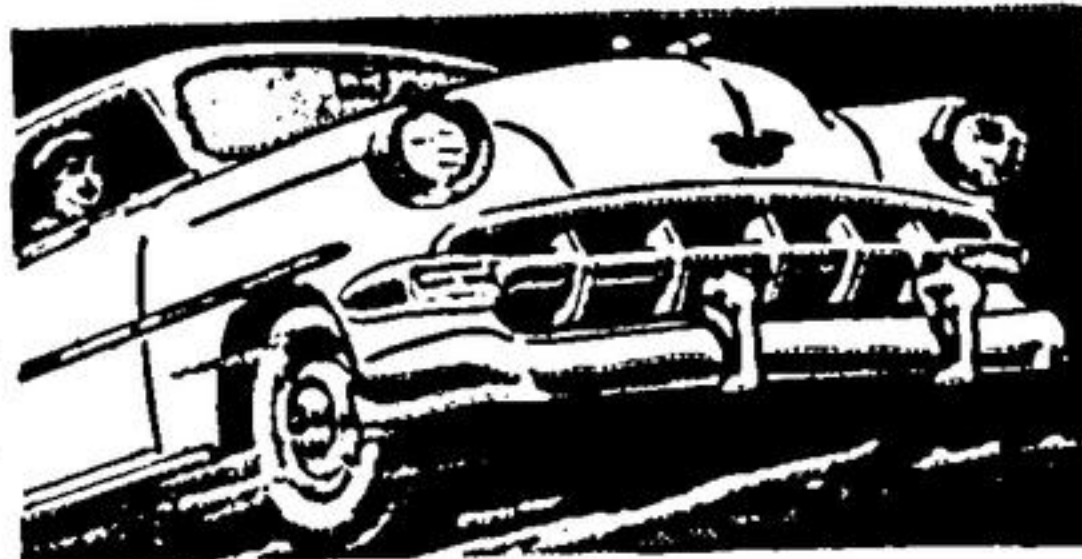

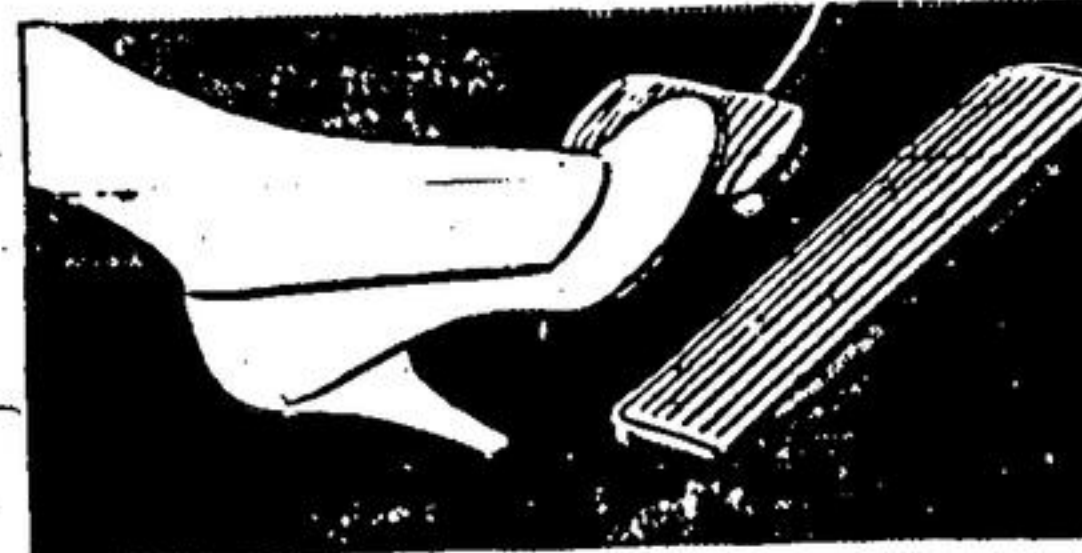
