Widely known as Ontario's hydro chairman and CNE's first vice president, We. Saunders succeeds J. A. Northey, president during 1952-53.

The new president brings to office an extensive background of Canadian National Exhibition activity - as a competitor, as an exhibitor, as an executive official, as an ardent enthusiast of paddling and other water sports. Mr. Saunders has Sparticipated in former Canadian National Exhibition paddling competitions and has also served as the chairman of the exhibition's sports committee. During the past year he was instrumental in organizing sports for the Canadian Olympic Training Camp to be held annually at the CNE grounds. Athletes from all Canadian provinces will be invited to compete.
