It is every citizen's duty to inform themselves about the working of our government, and for every scout to take an interest in how government works. More scouts should earn their Citizen Badge! The following information will prove holpful for this

__Dominion Elections; All British subjects of the full age of 21 years without distinction of sex, who have resided in Canada for at least 12 months, and in the district where they intend to vote for at least two months immediately preceding the date of the election are entitled to vote in an election for members of the House of Commons. Indians, persons, of the Chinese race, judges, returning officers, election clerks, . criminal prisoners and those . dis- h qualified for corrupt practices are not allowed to vote, (Under the Indian Act certains provisions are made whereby certain Indians are granted the right to vote.)

· Ekimos, persons under · restraint owing to mental diseases, Japanese, Chinese and Hindus in British Columbin, Doukhobors in British Columbia and inmates of poor houses are disqualified from voting in Federal elections.

Provincial: Every man or woman is entitled to vote who is (1) a British subject, (2) of the full age og 21 years (in the province of Saskatchewan the age has been lowered to 18 and in Alberta to 19), if (3) he or he has resided in the province for at least a year, and (4) In the electoral district where he or she seeks to vote for at least 3 months prior to the date of closing of the registration of voters. The names of the followings perons, however, are not allowed to be placed upon the voters list:

(1) The judges of the Court of district Court: (2) Persons of the Chinese race;

(3) Indians;
(4) Persons disqualified because of being convicted of corrupt elso. tion practices;
