**The Citizen Badge**  
Democracy is an everyday word that has come to mean different things to different people, but to us the best definition is that it is a system of government which exists for the greater happiness, appreciation and usefulness of man. It is every citizen's duty to inform themselves about the working of our government, and for every scout to take an interest in how government works. More scouts should earn their Citizen Badge! The following information will prove helpful for this:

**Dominion Elections:** All British subjects of the full age of 21 years without distinction of sex, who have resided in Canada for at least 12 months, and in the district where they intend to vote for at least two months immediately preceding the date of the election are entitled to vote in an election for members of the House of Commons. Indians, persons of the Chinese race, judges, returning officers, election clerks, criminal prisoners and those disqualified for corrupt practices are not allowed to vote. (Under the Indian Act certain provisions are made whereby certain Indians are granted the right to vote.)

**Provincial:** Every man or woman is entitled to vote who is (1) a British subject, (2) of the full age of 21 years (in the province of Saskatchewan the age has been lowered to 18 and in Alberta to 19), (3) he or she has resided in the province for at least a year, and (4) in the electoral district where he or she seeks to vote for at least 3 months prior to the date of closing of the registration of voters. The names of the following persons, however, are not allowed to be placed upon the voters list: (1) The Judges of the Court of Appeal, the Queen's Bench and the district Court; (2) Persons of the Chinese race; (3) Indians; (4) Persons disqualified because of being convicted of corrupt election practices; (5) Prisoners of a jail or prison.

**ON UNIFORM**  
As a scout you are privileged to wear the uniform of the Scout Brotherhood. It sets you apart as a boy who has promised, on your honour, to live up to certain ideals. You became a Scout because you wanted to have fun and fellowship with others who were interested in the adventure of Scouting. Now that you are a Scout, you have accepted certain obligations, and responsibilities. You, in the eyes of your community, are a boy set apart who has promised to do certain definite things. Because you are a Scout you have accepted the privilege of wearing the world-wide uniform of the movement. This uniform is the outward and visible sign that you have promised to live the Scout Promise and Law.
