GRAND UNION CO. IN "BEST MANAGED" LIST

For the fourth consecutive year Grand Union, parent company of Grand Union-Carroll's, which operates a Georgetown store, has been named among the top best managed companies in Canada, and the States by the American Institute of Management.

In the announcement made in New York recently, 348 companies are listed as "excellently managed" during 1953. The finding was based on a continuing study of 30,000 leading concerns in this country and the United States. The top twelve companies rated according to the group's point system of evaluating ten key management factors, were named as:

The Procter and Gamble Company; American Telephone and Telegraph Company; E. I. DuPont de Nemours and Co. Inc.; General Motors Corporation; The National Cash Register Company; Eastman Kodak Company; Grand Union Company; B. F. Goodrich Company; Hotels Statler Company Inc.; Minneapolis Mining and Manufacturing Company; C.I.T. Financial Corporation; National City Bank of New York.

Each of the top twelve companies scored more than 9,000 points out of a possible 10,000 under the Institute's evaluation system. A minimum of 7,500 points is required for qualification as "excellently managed."

FARM NEWS

HOG SURVEY SHOWS INTERESTING FIGURES

The third quarterly survey has just been completed by Halton Hog Producers, states A. R. Service, secretary of the association. In the survey the same twenty producers are contacted each quarter. In contrast to the survey made in early October, when the twenty producers had 81 sows, the survey just completed this month shows the number of sows at 57. In pigs 2 months and under, the recent survey reveals 329 weaning pigs in contrast to 271 of the same age four months ago. In the age group 2 to 4 months the February survey reveals 242 in contrast to 314, four months ago. Finally in the age group 4 months and over, there were 252 pigs in the February survey against 231 on the same farms last September.
