Parking Restrictions For Victoria, Glen Road

New parking restrictions in the College View district were adopted by Council at Monday's meeting, acting to iron out traffic difficulties which have occurred around the Smith and Stone plant.

Council decided to establish No Parking on the west side of Victoria Street to the Smith and Stone plant, and on the north side of Glen Road which parallels the plant. On the opposite side of these streets, two hour parking will be put in effect.

A serious drainage problem on Floyd Valey's property was brought up by Deputy Reeve Norton, and council intimated that some action would be taken to clear up the situation for Mr. Valey.

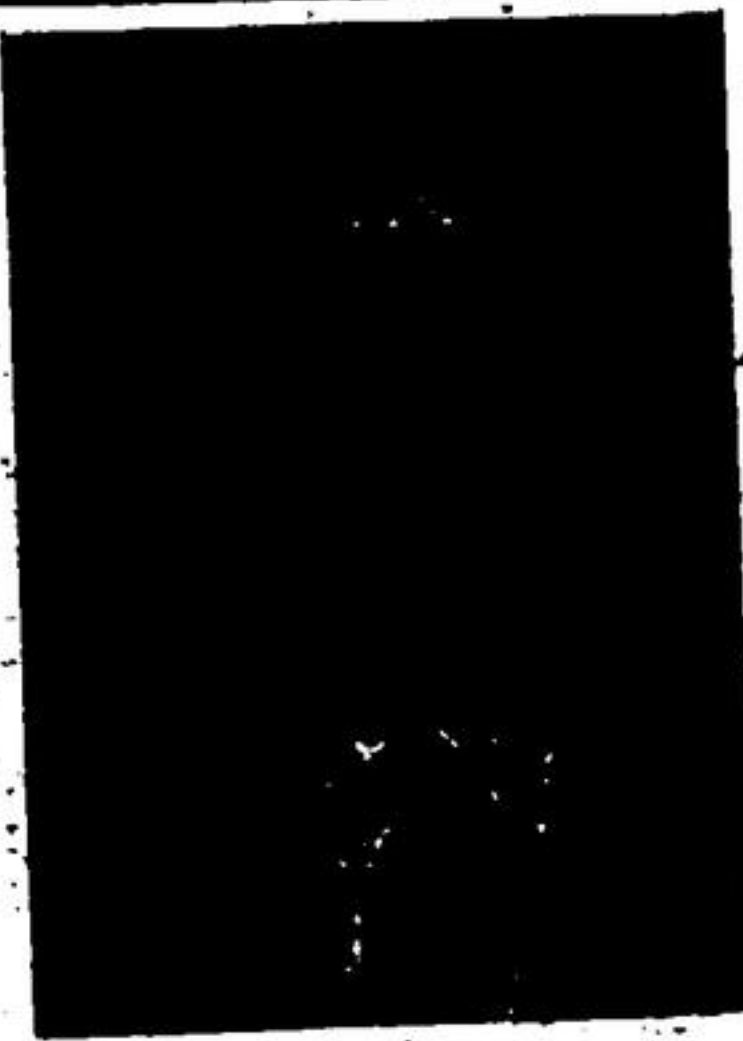

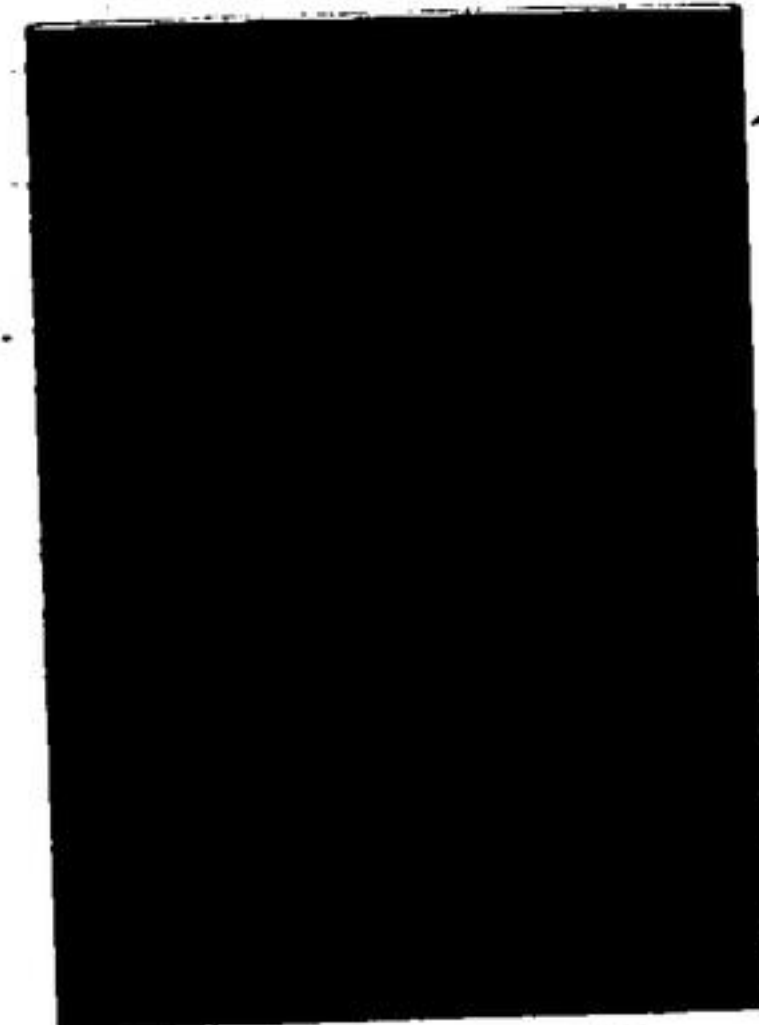
