**Miss Agnes McPhail**

"High purpose and sincerity of motives are fortunately not rare in Canadian public life," says an editorial in the Toronto Telegram, "but in the late Agnes McPhail these qualities were combined with a genuine talent for politics in such measure as to set her career apart."

Similar tributes were paid in almost every Canadian newspaper on Monday, following news of the death of Canada's first woman Member of Parliament.

Agnes McPhail made her name a household word, first as a federal member at Ottawa,

and later in the Ontario House. Always a member of the Opposition, she was a formidable critic and left the imprint of her thinking and her personality upon many legislative measures. Although out of politics for the past few years, she was not at all forgotten, and in fact each time a federal or provincial election came up, the name of Agnes McPhail was always mentioned as a possible candidate in some riding.

In her death, Canada and Ontario lose an industrious servant of the public interest whose example elevated our political life.

**WHAT COUNCIL DID**

**Purchase Mayor's Land For Street Extension**

With council and owner agreeing that the price is a fair one, Georgetown council on Monday decided to pay Mayor Jack Armstrong \$1700 for a piece of property needed for an Elm Street road extension.

To avoid expensive appropriation proceedings, council had previously decided to ask for an impartial opinion and F. McNiven, assessor for the town of Milton, was asked to

make a report. Mr. McNiven pointed out that acquisition of the property which measures 385 feet by 167 feet by the town would lower the value of other possible building lots on the property.

The mayor vacated the chair during the discussion, and when asked, indicated he would be satisfied with Mr. McNiven's appraisal.

Daylight Saving Time will be adopted in Georgetown again this year to coincide with dates adopted in Toronto.

Plans for a 106 lot subdivision by Sunbeam Construction Co. on property they are acquiring near their present subdivision in the east part of town, were approved, contingent on the opening of Windsor Road through No. 7 highway.

Council was notified by the company holding the town liability insurance that a claim of \$25 has been paid to Del Wallace, in connection with a drainage claim, and a similar case involving Stan Wright has also been re-opened.

**Sees Great Need for Orange Lodge Today**

At the annual meeting of Halton County Orange Lodge held in the Oddfellows Hall, Milton, on February 6th, a crowded hall heard the Provincial Grand Master of Ontario West, Rt. Wor. Bro. Gordon Keyes speak.

Rt. Wor. Bro. Keyes congratulated the county on its progress during the past year, especially on the organization of a new Orange Lodge at Oakville and reorganization of Stewarttown Lodge.

He also stated that it was necessary for each primary lodge to elect masters and other officers with leadership ability, and the need for operation on a community level instead of leaving much of the work to Grand, Provincial and County lodges.

Rt. Wor. Bro. Keyes went on to say that the Orange Association is needed today as never before to oppose all attempts to abolish the Union Jack and attempts to weaken British Protestant influence in this country. Among these attempts, he noted, are increased efforts to make Canada bilingual, a Canadian governor general and its inevitable outcome, that of having a French speaking Roman Catholic as a governor-general in the near future.

In conclusion, he stated, local lodges must bring in new members, get old members to rejoin the order and make Protestants realize the defence of their religion is of more importance than television or hockey games.

In the afternoon, the meeting was addressed by Wor. Bro. Block, Dep. Provincial Grand Lecturer. He mentioned, among other things, that full support must be given to the Protestant churches and the public school system.
