IODE Reviews Activities At Recent Annual Meeting

With a membership of 65. Countesses of Strathmore Chapter, IODE, had a busy year in 1953, according to the annual report compiled by secretary Hilda Erwin and read at last week's annual meeting.

The organization helps in welfare work, in the town and the country at large, as well as fostering ties with Britain which is the root of its organization.

Last year, for instance, money donations included a \$50 bursary to a high school student as well as a \$10 prize at commencement, and \$25 to the Lucy Morrison Memorial Fund. Ten dollar donations were made to Halton Music Festival, the local Coronation fund, Poppy Fund, and the Soldier, Sailor and Airman's Fund.

But distribution of money is not the primary object with the IODE ladies. For instance, they take an interest in an "adopted" school in Haliburton and each year send boxes of clothing and a Christmas parcel to children in an impoverished part of Ontario. They sponsored a tag day for the blind, raising \$270, and Chapter members helped in the Blindcraft booth at Georgetown Fair. Christmas gifts were also sent to blind residents of the community. In 1953 two food parcels were sent each month overseas. This will be discontinued this year as the Soldier, Sailor and Airman's Family Association will be taking over this work.

Guest speakers at chapter meetings last year included Sybil Bennett, M.P. who spoke on "Women on the Jury", Joyce Nevitt, who explained the public health clinic at which chapter members assist twice monthly at the Legion Hall; and Rosemary Jordan who gave a talk on the functions of a library in the community.

The regent, Jean Mackenzie attended the Coronation and described her impressions to fellow mem-

bers when she returned. Two IODE films "House of Windsor" and "Queen Mary's Carpet" were shown last year and Mrs. Fred Helson showed pictures of a trip to Florida, as well as scenes taken around Georgetown.

Chapter members are knitting baby jackets which will be sent to headquarters for shipment overseas.

Money making projects during 1953 included sale of Christmas cards, a lawn tea at the home of Mrs. Arthur Beaumont, a Valentine dance, an auction sale among the members and a theatre party.

In April the Chapter celebrated its fourteenth anniversary with a dinner at the Yellow Briar Inn.

WAS MEMBER OF PIONEER FAMILY

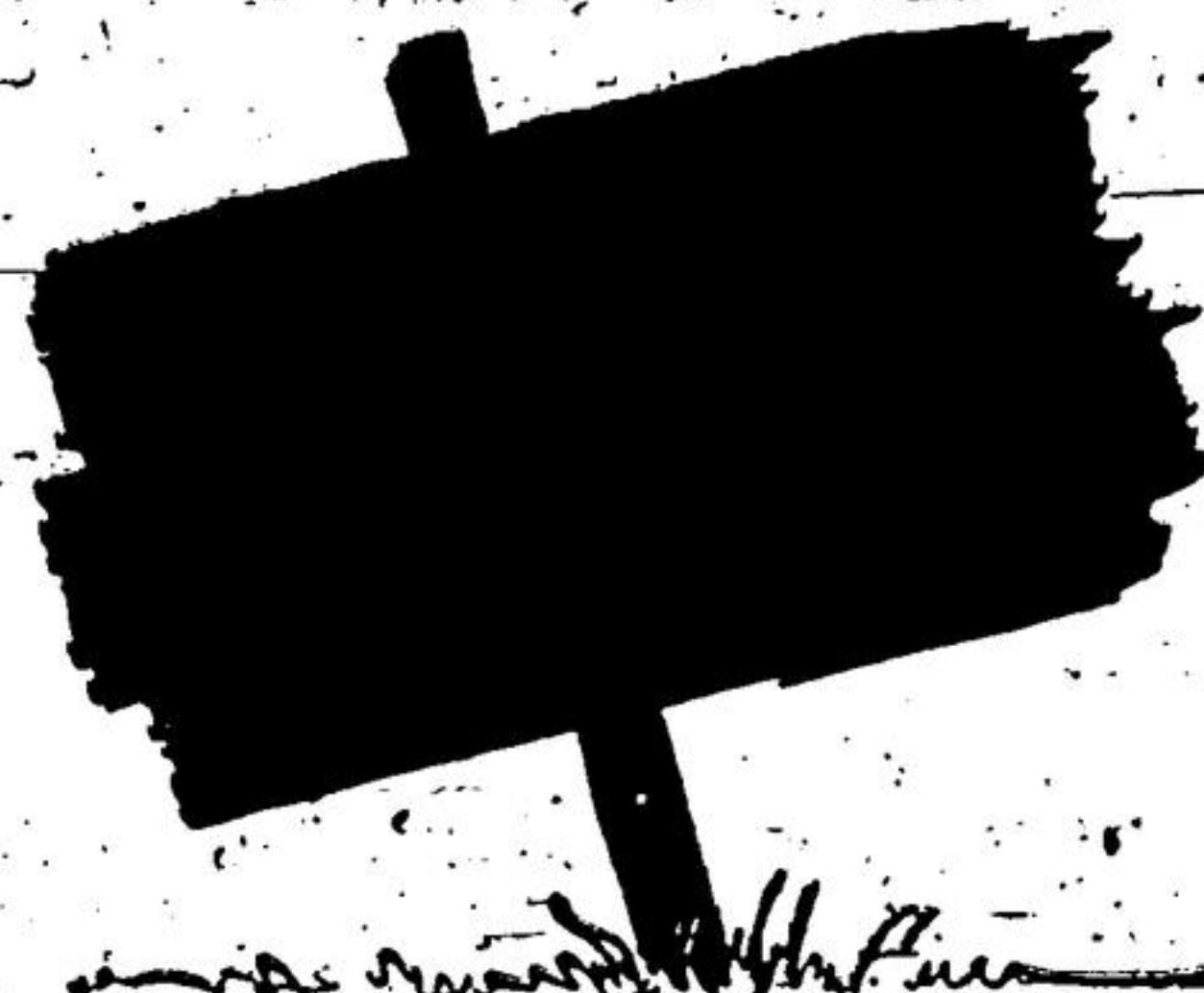

NORVAL Basement Hall Major St. Paul's Improvement

The annual vestry meeting of St. Paul's Church, Norval, was held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. A. Barnett on Monday evening, February 1st.

The rector, Rev. J. E. Maxwell, opened the meeting with prayer, following which the vestry declaration was signed by all present. Mr. H. Perkins was appointed vestry clerk and read the minutes of the previous meeting. The rector, in his report on the state of the parish pointed out that the congregation had grown in numbers and that the year had been a busy one for St. Paul's, seeing the completion of the new basement hall, landscaping of church grounds, and the installation of a water supply for the parish hall.

Miss Prairie Maguire, read the financial statement and explained that after all bills had been paid a substantial balance remained for new work to be undertaken.

It was agreed that a new ceiling be built in the church as soon as possible. The wardens were instructed to look into this matter.

He expressed the hope that the new year would see even greater advance by St. Paul's congregation. He thanked Mr. and Mrs. Barnett for the use of their home. The meeting closed with prayer, following which refreshments were served.

Following the vestry meeting St. Paul's Guild met briefly and the following officers were appointed: President, Mrs. Arthur Burton; vice president, Mrs. Barker; secretary, Mrs. J. Rawlingson; Publicity secretaries, Mrs. Barnett and Mrs. Fricker; Sick visitors, Mrs. G. Sherry and Mrs. H. Gollop.

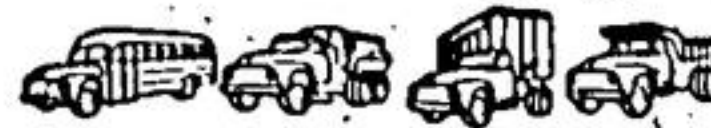
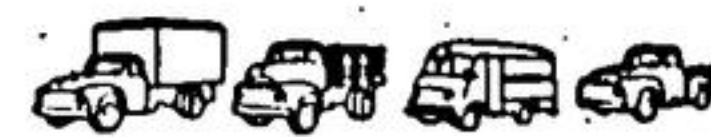
