Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Emmerson, he was born in Durham, England, and was a coal miner before coming to Canada. He served in the first war with an English regiment and was a member of the local Legion and the Imperial Section.

Surviving is a daughter, Eunice, Mrs. Norman Lowrey, one granddaughter, Carol Lowrey, and two brothers, William of town and Robert of Durham, England. He was predeceased by two young sons, who died during the flu epidemic during the first war and a daughter Sally.

Alfred Barker conducted the funeral service at the McClure Funeral Home on Friday and members of Branch 120, Canadian Legion, took part in a Legion service at the graveside in Greenwood Cemetery. APRON, PANTRY SALE AT LADIES' MEETING

An apron and pantry sale arranged by Mrs. Floria Kodwell and Mrs. A. Vannatter was a successful part of a meeting of the Local Council of Women on Friday at the home of Mrs. R. T. Paul, President Mrs. J. W. Kerr was in the chair.

Mrs. A. M. Nielsen, as chairman of the committee on legislation, read a paper on lower rights of women, and urged alertness to any proposed legislation depriving women of economic rights in marriage. Rehabilitation of disabled civilians, penal reform and health insurance were also under consideration.

Other papers and discussion dealt mainly with projects and plans under consideration during the spring executive meeting of the Provincial Council of Women held last week in the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, when agenda and plans were outlined for the annual national meeting scheduled for June 25-July 1 in Fredericton, N.B.

Tentative plans were also made for the international meeting at Helsinki, Finland in June. On her way to that meeting, Mrs. Turner Bone of Montreal, national president and Canadian delegate, will go to Norway and Sweden to meet council members of those countries. There will be other delegates from Canada — names to be announced later.

At the Toronto meeting progress was reported in projects dealing with services for children in the community, work with new Canadians, the problem of the older worker, and services for senior citizens. At Fredericton special consideration will be given to problems relating to mothers working outside the home and methods of getting more qualified women to run for public office.

Five dollars was voted to the Halton Music Festival.

Mrs. Blake Leslie added much enjoyment to the afternoon by reading the teacups and predicting a rosy future for all. Assistant hostesses were Mrs. J. B. Mackenzie, Mrs. Vannatter and Miss Hettie Lawson.
