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PARIS MINISTER HERE AS ST. JOHN PREACHER

In the absence of Rev. John M. Rmith in Detroit, the pulpit of St. John's United Church was occupied last Sunday by Rev. Royal E. Newmen of Paris, Ont. who will be remembered by many as supplying so acceptably last summer during the holiday season. He was evidently pleased with the number of boys and girls present and spoke to them about the mirror, how it reflected truthfully whatever was placed before it. A smile was returned for s smile, even a frown for a frown. And people are much like a mirror: they will generally reflect what we show to them: truth, kindness, happiness. Jesus want boys and girls to show these kind of things and His love, so as to help make the world

In his meditation, Mr. Newman's subject was "the church," and his text was from his scripture lesson in Matthew 18, where Jesus asked His disciples "But whom say ye that I am?" and Simon Peter answered Thou are the Christ the Son of the living God." And Jesus suld "Thou are Peter, and upon this rock I will build My church and the gates of hell shall not preval against it." The faith and truth underlying Peter's declaration was to be the foundation for the Christian as a cattle disease in Ontario. The

Mr. Newman is retired after 40 years of Christian ministry and duging recent months has taken the opportunity to visit a number of different churches; Anglican, Baptist, Presbyterian, United - and from these visits and what he knew of the Salvation Army, the thought that came uppermost to him was the great potentiality of the church; the power for good it has been, still is, and can be. Driving along from Paris, he couldn't help but notice rural churches dotted here and there, with sincere ordinary folk and many boys and girls wending their way to worship. He felt that these rural churches, and such as those in a rural community like Georgetown, had a quiet solidness and faith, underlying their worship, which made a great contribution to the foundation of Christ's Church in our land; to the building foundation of our nation in righteousness, and a great influence for good throughout the world. . He looked to our homes to provide the right environment in which our Christianity could best take root and grow, to be further nurtured and nourished in our Sunday Schools and churches, even in our schools and on our playgrounds, everywhere, if we would be a nation exalted of God

because of our righteousness. Mr. Newman paid tribute to Hon. Lester Pearson, with whom he grew up and attended school, for his Christian character and his Christian attitude to world affairs in often difficult circumstances. He also averred that no statesman need ever be ashamed or afraid to take a Christian stand in national or world matters; that God would honor such. God created the world and He has a purpose running through it, and though this may seem to lag at times, it can never be thwarted or defeated, or as Jesus said about the founding of His church: "the gates of hell shall not prevail against it." God will vindicate every effort of His church and of His people to, establish His purpose and Kingdom on earth, wherein all shall dwell in unity and goodwill, brothers under His Fatherhood.

Mr Nowman stressed our great heritage of every kind, how much we owe to the great efforts and unselfishness of those who have gone before us, and exhorted the careless and indifferent among us to appreciate this heritage and to strive to pass on to others an even greater heritage of Christian love and faith, building Christ's church on its proper foundation and having it fulfit its rightful purpose and destiny. At the evening service Mr. Newman chose the familiar text: John 3-16 "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosover believeth in Him, should not perish, but have everlasting life," making the theme of his meditation "that God is interested in everyone of us, you and me." God is very enxious that we should live eternal life with Him, yet gives us the choice of accepting or rejecting His simple condition: "to believe and so not perish but have eternal life." Rejecting would show that we are indifferent or careless about our higher good; that we are not sufficiently interested in ourselves as He is, as to which we chose of good or ill, content to let selfishnesss, pride, impurity, hatred and such like remain as part of our living, and not seeking to get them out of our lives and their places taken by love, helpfulness, purity, and peace, the eternal values' and virtues. Much of this World's ills and pains, worries and fears, are deep rooted in the doubts of the soul, not having God to lean upon," rather than physical illness. An acceptance of God's simple gift, with trust, faith and prayer would often be the means of healing or greatly helping, and even where God's will was otherwise for some good reason of His own as in the case of Paul's

During the past week a meeting relative to the proposed Brucellosis programme was held in each of the four townships in the county under the suspices of the Halton Live Stock association.

All four meetings, which were chaired by Edwin Harrop, president of the association; went on record as favouring compulsory calfhood vaccination of all female calves and to this end recommended that pelstions be circulated.

At all four meetings a few while favouring calmood vaccination, expressed their disapproval of compulsory feature. However, after hearing all features of the program discussed by Dr. Harold Worton of the Ontario Live Stock Branch, and Dr. Demude of the Halton Health Unit, with a few exceptions intimated they were prepared to support the programme,
