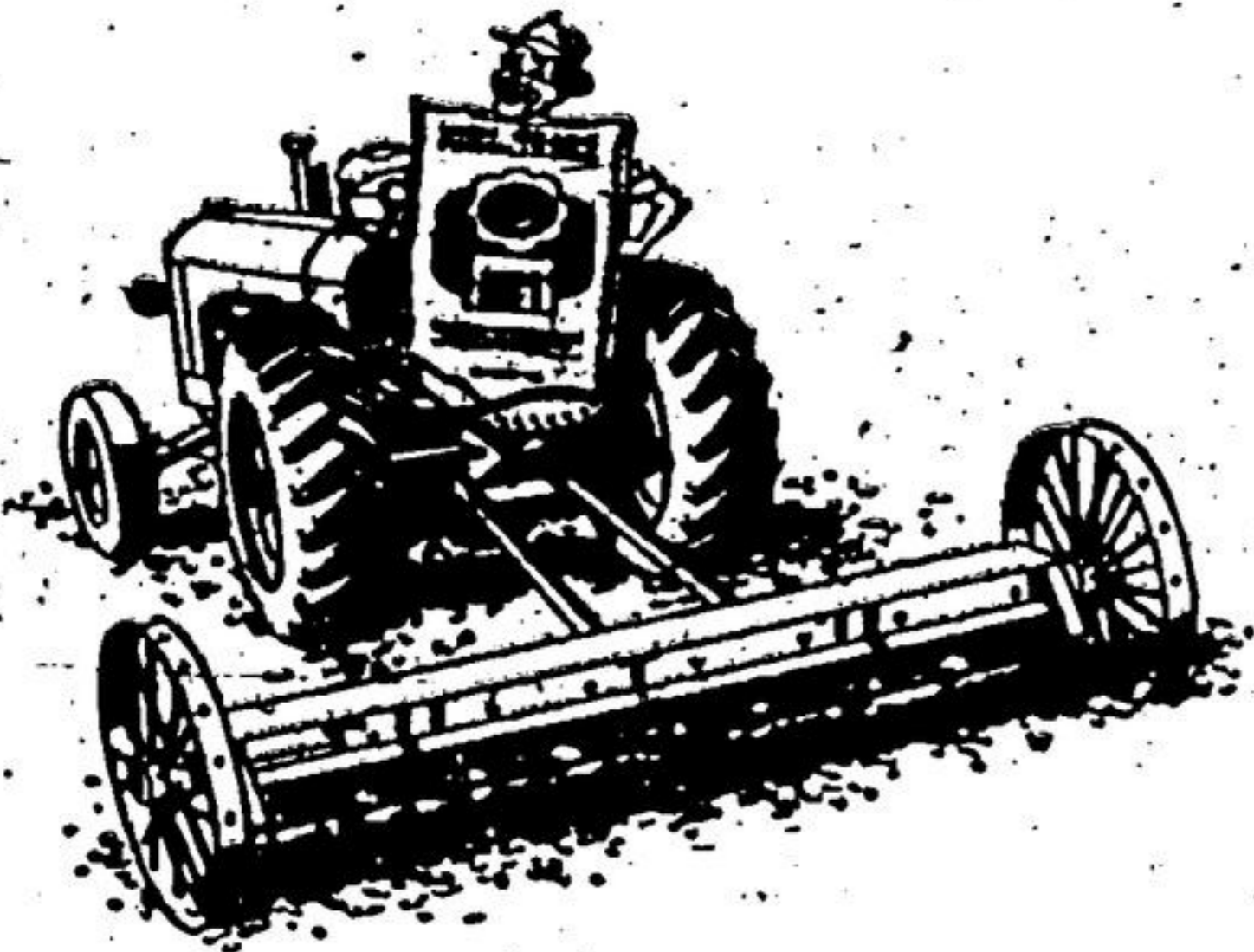

Bell Telephone Report Shows Year of Growth

With more customers, more shareholders and more employees than ever before in its history, The Bell Telephone Company of Canada enjoyed "a state of vigorous good health" during 1953, according to the company's 74th annual report issued on February 25.

A total of \$93,936,298 in wages and salaries was paid to Bell employees in Ontario and Quebec last year. At the end of 1953 the company employed 31,502 people — 19,917 women and 11,585 men.

The number of shareholders increased during 1953 to 115,789, a record for any Canadian company. Most shareholders — 88 per cent — reside in Canada and 91 per cent live in Ontario and Quebec. The majority of individual shareholders are women.

The construction of new facilities during the year was the most extensive in the company's history and a record 151,333 telephones were added, bringing the total number in service to 2,127,456. More than half the orders for telephones were met promptly, and those remaining unfilled were further reduced to 52,862 from 58,354.

Commenting on this aspect of the report, W. O. Misener, Bell manager for this region, said that 124 telephones were added in Georgetown during 1953, bringing the total to 1844 and leaving 2 unfilled orders at the year-end.

Net income amounted to \$2.65 a share, compared with \$2.47 a share in 1952. The usual \$2 dividend was paid and an amount equivalent to 65 cents a share was added to surplus. The expenditure of \$85,700,000 for new construction, necessitated by the continuing demand for service, was the highest amount for a single year in the company's history.

Total taxes amounted to \$29,809,000.

Government and business continued to turn to the company for their requirements. The company's services specially devised to meet microwave radio relay system between Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal, which also carries telephone conversations, was used extensively by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation to transmit television programs between its stations in these centres. A "bell and light" attack-warning network, first of its kind in Canada, was installed in Hamilton. The company assumed responsibility for the widespread general communications requirements of the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario.
