## W. C. Reynolds 40 Years Provincial Paper Employee

Office manager at Provincial Paper Mill's Georgetown division since 1917. William C. Reynolds, 57, was buried in Greenwood Cemetery on Saturday following a funeral service at the McClure Funeral Home.

Mr. Reynolds, who took seriously ill last fall, died in hospital at Jacksonville, Florida on Tuesday. Son of the late John Reynolds and Mary Ann Richards, he was a native of Toronto, and had worked in every one of the Provincial mills, since joining the company in the city forty years ago. Serving overseas with the 102nd Battalion, he was a prisoner of war when the Armistice came. After the war he worked in Georgetown, where he married Opal Elizabeth McWhirter in 1922. He was employed at the old "lower mill" when he was transferred to Thorold later that year, and nine months later he went to Port Arthur where he served as traffic manager for 25 years.

In Port Arthur he was an active worker as a member of the Kiwanis Club, the Oddfellows Lodge and the Parks Board. In Georgetown he served as a member of the Session of Knox Presbyterian Church. He was a member of the Quarter Century Club of the mill and was first president when the local organization was formed.

Surviving are his wife, a brother Franklin of New Toronto, and a sister, Mrs. Ben Kirk, St. Paul, Minnesota. Friends from many parts of the province attended the service here, including Mr. and Mrs. W. Wheeler and Mr. and Mrs. Henry S. Mosher, who were neighbors in Port Arthur. Others were from Tonawanda, N.Y., Toronto, Hamilton, Stratford, Thorold, Port Credit, Burlington, Campbellville and Hornings Mills.

The funeral service was conducted by Rev. Alex Calder and pallbearers were John Bus, Archie Reid, Allan Ball and Willard Morris from Toronto head office, and Ray Pomerooy and Hugh Dickie from the local mill.

## Prudential Insurance Agent Here 20 Years

Prudential Insurance agent in Georgetown until he retired in 1944, Arthur Reeve, 60, died in Toronto on Wednesday. Mr. Reeve was stricken with a fatal heart attack while visiting in the city with friends who formerly lived in Georgetown, Mr. and Mrs. James Eastwood.

Born at Eaton in Norfolk County, England, he had lived in Canada since 1911. Mr. and Mrs. Reeve first settled at Glen Williams and he worked as a farmer and quarryman, then for seven years worked for Provincial Paper, at the old "lower mill" and later at the coating mill. In 1924, he started a successful career with the Prudential company as their local insurance salesman.

He was a member of the Orange Lodge, and a faithful worker in the Baptist Church, where he had served as a deacon and as a member of the finance committee.

Surviving are his wife, Annie M. Dix, four sons, Sidney, Toronto, William and Robert, Georgetown, and Albert, Pickering, a daughter, Mrs. C. Gilbert, Toronto, eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. A daughter Frances died at the age of 10 in 1930. Three brothers of a family of 9, Herbert, Albert and Henry predeceased him. He leaves three brothers and two sisters in England, George, Robert and Bertie of Norwich, Mrs. E. Pepper and Mrs. H. Bradford of London.

Rev. Alfred J. Barker conducted the service in the Baptist Church, on Friday, and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Jack Austing, Brampton, Watson Winfield, Roy Magloughlin, Fred Armstrong, William Truck, and David Bowman.

### Park Residents Object To Motorcycle Meet

Forty-four residents of the park district object to a motorcycle meet planned in the park by the July 1st holiday week-end.

A petition signed by these 44 people asked council at Monday's meeting to reconsider an earlier decision to grant the use of the park. The petition pointed out that this is a residential district and should not be subjected to the noise and dust which races entail, and said the meet would be of no value to the town.

At the same time, a letter to the Yellowjackets Club, which is promoting the meet, asked that they cooperate in clearing cycles off the streets each evening as early as possible.
