Visiting Baptists at Evening Church Service

"A Word from Beyond" was Rev. A. J. Barker's sermon title observing the 150th anniversary of the Upper Canada Bible Society, at the morning worship at the Baptist Church. Mr. Barker laid a real challenge to his congregation beginning by asking the question — "Why read the Bible, why do we have all this task for this particular book, why is it so important that men should read the Bible? Generations ago it was the accepted thing but so many people today feel it is out of date, written 2,000 years ago, they believe it has no connection with our complex problems of today. We should not read our Bible thinking it a book of glorified advice, but we should remember we need the moral teachings from it when the prohibitions are accepted. The Bible is unique — it is a word far beyond for our human predicament.

We turn to the Bible when we are distressed and broken-hearted because we find assurance from it. We want God's word, which is the whole redeeming activity of God saying to us that God loves us, and he seeks to draw us to himself to make us his children. The climax is Christ coming into our midst and God revealing himself through Christ. The Bible comes for every soul through the Grace of God — the Word of God.

Mr. Douglas Peck sang Little's arrangement of "The Lord is My Shepherd."

The executive of the Baptist Brotherhood of the Guelph Association were in charge of the evening service. Mr. Griff of Stratford conducted the service and Mr. R. Collins, Preston, read the lesson Matthew 5:13-20. Mr. J. Ross, Preston, led the congregation to the throne of grace in the evening prayer. Special music was provided by Messrs. L. Wolfe and James Ross, Preston playing a violin duet "Harbored to Jesus," and a vocal solo "An Old Fashioned Meeting" from Mr. W. Fowler of Galt.

Mr. T. Penfold of Guelph, brought the evening meditation taking as his text "Ye are the salt of the earth." The sense of sin is very old fashioned in this modern world. Church people seem to have lost their zeal. Unless good men stood for good laws we would soon have a lawless nation. The one thing needed for wrong to prosper is for a good man to do nothing. We should discipline ourselves in such a manner that our lives and witness will have the same influence on the people of today as what the first Christians at Antioch had upon the people of that day. A Christian life is not one subscribing to certain creeds not a code of ethics, but it is a person who has Christ centred in his life. A comparison of a new born babe fed and nurtured to grow into strong manhood was made to that of a new Christian who needs all the proper food to grow in Christian life.

Immediately following this service an informal gathering was held in the Sunday School room, and light refreshments served by the men of the congregation.

OPP Safety Officer Speaks to Lions, Guests

It was visitors night at Georgetown Lions Club last Tuesday evening with members of the town council and officials as guests to hear an address by Inspector Bob Witts of the Ontario Provincial Police.

"When it comes to highway traffic accidents and control of speed on our highways we have to get away from the 'why don't they?' complex and say 'why don't we?' he said.

Highway traffic problems are the biggest job we have to handle today, said the inspector, and only when the public realizes that they have a big part to play will we have less accidents on our highways. It is one thing to make laws to control speed and another thing to enforce them. Some say the government should control the horsepower of motor cars, but speed is what the public wants and the manufacturer is only making cars that the public demand.

"Do you realize, gentlemen, that the high powered car you are driving today can't be stopped any sooner in case of an emergency than those of fifteen years ago," said Inspector Witts.

He said that teen-agers are given credit for many of the accidents of today, but had parents taken time to instruct their children in their tender years, this would not happen.

"When you step into your car today, remember that only eternal vigilance and constant care will keep you safe on our highways," said the inspector.
