FARM NEWS

DHIA Members Study Two Types of Stabling

Halton DHIA members, 60 to 70 strong, on March 15th visited the dairy barns of Andrew Woodley and Cliff May and Son, both of Trafalgar Township. The first named stable is of the loose housing type with a home constructed milking parlour; while that at the May farm is of the conventional tie-up type. Time Studies had been conducted on both barns by the staff of the Farm Economics Branch, in Toronto. Both operators, according to Dr. H. L. Patterson, have their time requirement for chores-cut to a minimum, and represent two of the lowest in this regard in Dairy Herd Improvement work in Ontario. Both types had their supporters — in any event all went home with new ideas which could be applied to good effect in the home barns. At the morning session, the chief speakers were Dr. H. L. Patterson and John Clark of the Farm Economics Branch, and Cliff Morrow of the Ontario Live-stock Branch.

Competing for the newly donated Calvert Trophy, Georgetown rinks skipped by Erin Thompson and Perc Cleave were successful in winning it for the first time last Thursday.

With total scores to count, the two Georgetown rinks competed with rinks from Erin and Hillsburgh. The trophy will be used for competition between the three clubs next year, and it has been decided that in future it will be a 4-rink competition. It will be used to foster friendly inter-club meetings and the holder can be challenged at any time during the season. Thursday's results were: Georgetown (Cleave) 91, Erin (G. Horton) 71, Erin (C. Barber) 9, Hillsburgh (Bert Awrey) 6; Hillsburgh (E. Coxe) 12, Georgetown (Thompson) 9.

Cleave's rink was composed of Dick Hawes, Bert Fiddler and Horace Barnes. Playing with Thompson were George Smith, Ross Thompson and Bill Latimer.

After play was completed, Bob Darou introduced Brian Burkart who made the initial presentation on behalf of the Calvert Company. Several competitors spoke briefly and an enjoyable social period was enjoyed.

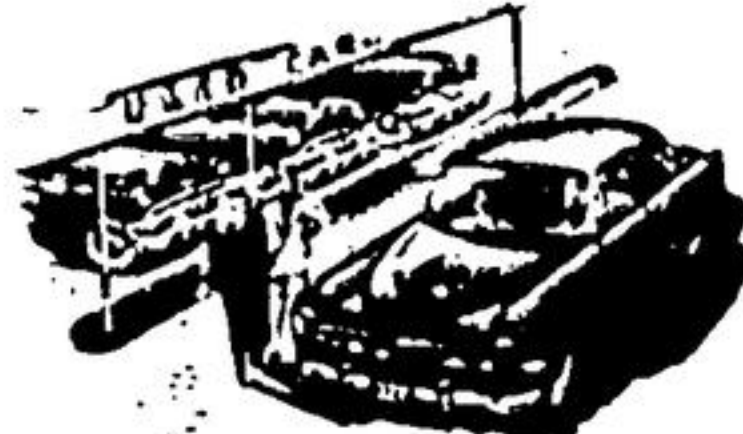

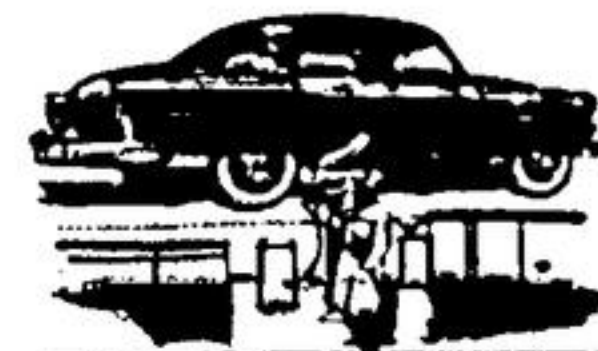
