Conservation Decision May be Made Next Month

' Fate of a proposal to form a Credit Valley Conservation Authority, which has been under consideration for four years, will be decided May

A meeting of representatives of the 15 municipalities which lie partially or totally within the Credit River watershed spreading through four counties, will vote on the lasue on that date.

To form an authority, two-thirds of the municipalities within a watershed must be represented at a conference called specifically for that purpose. Then two thirds of those in attendance must vote in favour of the step before it can be taken.

Wednesday night, 107 men and women, representative of the 15 municipalities, attended a dinner meeting at the Yellow Briar, to hear the advantages of such a project explained.

With flooding this spring at Churchville, interest in the formation of an authority has been revived. Most of those in attendance at Wednesday's meeting appeared to favour the proposal.

Municipalities within the watershed include: Ameranth, Mono, Erin, East Garafraxa, Caledon, Esquesing, Chinguacousy, Trafalgar and Toronto Townships, Acton, Georgetown, Brampton, Streetsville, Port Credit and Erin village.
